- To Charles Cowden Clarke, writer and public lecturer: 1 autograph letter signed: "Friday" [between 1844 and 1853]: (MISC 1320): from Putney; begins, "I have but a blind excuse to offer for my long silence to your last; but the miserable truth is, I have been in darkness with acute inflammation of the eye...".
- To Mary Cowden Clarke, literary scholar and writer: 2 letters: -- 1 autograph letter sisgned: 5 Dec [1845?]: (MISC 1318): from West Lodge, Putney Common; regarding her Shakespeare concordance;

begins, "I congratulate you and the world at the completion of your monumental work." -- 1 autograph letter signed: 16 May [1850]: (MISC 1319): from West Lodge; begins, "Many thanks for your thoughts of me ..."; with the envelope.

• To Leigh Hunt, poet, journalist and critic: 1 autograph leter signed: 2 May [between 1844 and 1853]: (H'ANA 0060): from West Lodge, Putney; enclosing a book [no longer present]; begins, "I know you were glad to [hear that?] the accompanying had been graciously received by his majesty the public.".
