## **Biographical Note**

José Greco, christened Constanzo Greco, was born 23 December 1918 in the mountains overlooking the Adriatic Sea. He remained in his birthplace Montori nei Frentani, Italy until June 1928 when his father, already living in the United States, achieved naturalized U.S. citizen status whereupon he made arrangements for the family to join him. By August 1928 Greco and his mother and sister moved to Hopkinson Avenue in Brooklyn, New York. In the early years, during which he learned English, José moved frequently between Manhattan and Brooklyn residences. It was through his sister Norina that he began to dance. He often accompanied Norina to her dance lessons at Madame Veola's studio on 59<sup>th</sup> Street between 5<sup>th</sup> and Madison Avenues. In time Greco was able to pick up on the dances himself, which won him the interest of the instructor Helene Veola (ca. 1897-1963). As he began his own dance lessons in 1933, the Leonardo da Vinci Art School, where Greco was in attendance closed. In the absence of school, he worked for the Atlas Ticket Agency, which enabled him to continue dancing.

By his twentieth birthday, Greco not only debuted in *Traviata* but also won the praises of the famed dancer Escudero Vicente whom he met in Madame Veola's studio. He, however, credits his dancing success to Argentinita (given name: Encarnación Lopez, 1900-1945), his renown-dancing partner from 1941-1945. Her death marked a series of different partners from the Argentinita's sister Pilar Lopez to Nana Lorca (given name: Djenana Modrego Vigarary). Her passing also inspired Greco to have his own company, so in 1948 he terminated his already deteriorating partnership with Pilar Lopez and formed The José Greco Spanish Ballet. That same year he also appeared in and choreographed dances for the film *Manolete*, the first of many later screen involvements including: *Sombrero* (1953), *Around the World in 80 Days* (1956), *Holiday is For Lovers* (1959), *Ship of Fools* (1965) and *The Proud and the Damned* (1972).

Over the course of the years, the dance company continued to tour North America and Europe. Greco married three times: Sarita Rivera, Nila Amparo and Nana Lorca. In addition, he had one common-law wife Lola de Ronda (given name: Aurelia Arroyo Garrido). By the late 1960s two of his five children, José-Luis and Alessandra, were dancing with the company. At about the same time as the birth of his sixth child Paolo (c. 1973), Greco and Nana, his wife and dance partner, founded the José Greco Foundation for the Hispanic Dance. The National Endowment for the Arts also funded the pair's tour of the United States designed to proliferate the Spanish dance culture. In 1974 they opened a dance studio The Centro de Arte Español in Marbella, Spain. During the 1980s José appeared either on TV (he was a guest of the *Ed Sullivan Show* in 1962) or on tour featuring his sons and daughters. Up until his death in December 2000, José remained active in the dance community from publishing his autobiography entitled *The Gypsy in My Soul* in 1977 to teaching at Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania where he was an adjunct professor of dance until the late 1990s.

## **Scope and Content Note**

This collection is not a personal account of José Greco's life. It is a visual framework for Spanish dance as conceived by José Greco. The photographs not only identify the company members, but also their performances, from the company's inception in 1948 through the 1980s. Particular highlights include performance images of *El Cortijo*, Greco's original and probably best-known choreography in a dance of the Spanish horsemen, and the *Bolero*, originally choreographed by Greco's famous partner Argentinita. Another favorite performance is *La Castellana*, a dance that symbolizes a boy's flirtation with the Castilian maidens. The opposite tension is suggested in the images of *Andalucia Flamenca*, a dance where the women seduces the male. In terms of company performers, the materials also include a large name index; the range of which includes all of Greco's wives: Sarita Rivera, Nila Amparo, Lola de Ronda (common-law) and Nana Lorca and dancers, including Paco Alonso, Pepita Nunes, Lupe del Rio, Luis Rivera, Teo Santelmo, Maria Soto and Juan Vallejo. The company member also includes musicians such as Roger Machado (composer) and Ricardo Modrego (guitarist).

The last section of materials contains original artwork, most of which is from set and costume designs of ballets like *Don Quijote*, *Barcelona Suite* and *Goyescas*. However, there is some original work by Greco from his art school days in addition to some of his set designs. Of particular interest here is his scrapbook, which contains the layout for his performance programs. In it are brief statements explaining the significance of his dances.

## **Series Descriptions**

### Series I: Photographs

6 boxes

**Sub-series 1: José Greco**—The contents at this level, both professional and personal, are devoted to Greco. As there were few recognizably personal photographs, the organization takes an objective approach and favors a chronologically based arrangement in order to show Greco's life in a timeline. This is partially because the images were better identified by date than by place or event. In the general category dated 1961-1965, for example, there is an image of Greco meeting President Kennedy.

**Sub-series 2: José Greco Company** – This series identifies the José Greco Company in terms of the dancers and thus arrangement favors alphabetical order. Note that this organization is according to the dancers' stage names and that there remains a significant amount of unidentified dancers, which are arranged here.

**Sub-series 3: Performance**— In order to preserve Greco's unique hybrid of flamenco, classical ballet and gypsy dances, this section's alphabetical arrangement specifies the dance. A general category exists for the remaining unidentified dance photographs. Please note that a significant amount of intellectual material is also available in the contact sheets, particularly as they contain images of the dances unavailable in any other format.

#### Series II: Originals

4 boxes

**Sub-series 1: José Greco**— This section contains Greco's earlier drawings for his art school and later work for the company. It also includes Greco's scrapbook, which contains the layout for a dance program. Please note that this program layout includes a brief description of the dances to be performed and could prove useful in identifying Greco's interpretation of the dance.

**Sub-series 2: José Greco Company**—The artwork in this series represents the performance design aesthetic as conceived by the set and costume designers employed by the José Greco Company. Because the materials do not necessarily represent all of a designer's work, the arrangement follows the dance title.

**Sub-series 3: Ephemera** – The contents here concludes with the ephemera that Greco collected over the years. Of particular emphasis in this category are the novelties such as a Texas diner menu diner printed with Greco on the cover.

#### Series III: Oversized 3 boxes

**Sub-series 1: Photographs** –This oversized section follows in the general arrangement scheme to identify either the performer or performance. It includes large-formatted images of Greco, his company and their dances. This sub-series also contains color stills for Greco's performance in the film *Manolete* (1948).

**Sub-series 2: Originals** – The content here comprises a significant amount of set and costume designs for the José Greco Company. The designs are arranged according to a performance. Please note that the arrangement is often, but not uniformly, specific to a single dance rather than to an entire ballet. There is also a portion of unidentified designs in this category.
