JOHN ROBERT GREGG COLLECTION

INTRODUCTION

John Robert Gregg (1867-1948) was the inventor of Gregg Shorthand (first known as Light Line Phonography). He founded the Gregg Publishing Company in 1896 and served as its President until his death in 1948. The Collection was donated by his widow and the Gregg Publishing Company over a period of years, and his widow retains the copyright.

CHRONOLOGY - JOHN ROBERT GREGG

- 1867, June 17. Born in Rockcorry, Monaghan County, Ireland.
- c. 1877. Partially deaf from a childhood accident. It affected his studies and Gregg only completed public education.
- 1885 Gregg moves to Glasgow Scotland
Pamphlet "Script Phonography" published in Glasgow, Scotland under the name of T.S. Malone. Gregg claimed joint authorship.
- c. 1887 Gregg relocates to Liverpool, England.
- 1888 Light-Line Phonography published in Liverpool, England.
- 1893 The Light-Liner, magazine established, edited and published by Gregg in Liverpool England.
Gregg emigrated to the United States from England.
Gregg conducted his first class at the Boy's Institute of Industry in Boston, Massachusetts.

The name "Light-Line" was already protected by copyright in the United States, so Gregg changed the name to "Gregg's Shorthand". Subsequently the possessive was dropped to "Gregg Shorthand".

Gregg's Shorthand: A Light-Line Phonography for the Millions, the first American edition published in Boston.
- 1895, Dec. Gregg relocates to Chicago, Illinois.
- 1896 Gregg School is established, later known as Gregg College in Chicago.
The Light-Liner, magazine was published in Chicago. Its name was changed to the Gregg Writer, Gregg served as editor 1901-46.

Gregg Publishing Company established.
- 1899 Gregg married Maida Wasson a teacher and journalist from Hannibal, Missouri.
- 1901 The Gregg Writer, magazine appeared under the editorship of John Robert Gregg, who held the position 1901-46. It was purchased in 1900 from Mr. W.E. Van Wert a teacher of Gregg shorthand.

- 1904 Gregg Shorthand was awarded the Silver Medal for excellence and speed at the Louisiana Purchase International Exposition, St. Louis Missouri.
 - 1905 Gregg becomes an United States citizen.
 - 1907-08 Gregg relocates to New York City. New York becomes the headquarters for the Gregg Publishing Company.
 - 1912 San Francisco office is established.
 - 1913 Twenty-fifth anniversary of the first publication. The Silver Jubilee was celebrated in Chicago and Liverpool, England.
 - 1915 Gold medal of honor is awarded to Gregg Shorthand for results accomplished by students in a model school at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.
 - 1919 Awarded the Victory Liberty Loan from the Secretary of Treasury. It acknowledges and records Gregg's patriotic service for interpreting espionage notes written in foreign shorthand systems, for the United States government during World War I.
- Boston office established.
- ca. 1922 De Bear Schools Ltd. purchased. The name was later changed to Gregg Schools Ltd., Great Britain.
 - 1925 British Company corporated.
 - 1928 Fortieth Anniversary celebrated in Liverpool, England. Dr. Gregg was presented with many tokens of esteem, among them a gold chest depicting the history of shorthand as a symbol of his lifelong interest.
- Maida Wasson, Gregg's first wife dies.
- 1929 Gold medals of honor awarded to Gregg Shorthand for excellence at the Sequi-Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.
- Received honorary degree(Master of Commercial Education) from Bryant-Stratton College in Providence, Rhode Island.
- Appointed delegate of the United States Government to to the International Congress for Commercial Education Amsterdam, Holland. Elected chairman of delegation and vice-president of the Congress.
- 1930 Received honorary degree(Doctor of Commercial Education) from Boston University, Boston.

- 1930 Married Janet Fraser Kinley, daughter of David Kinley economist and President Emeritus of Illinois University.
- 1931 Received gold medal for distinguish service from the Eastern Commercial Teachers Association.
- Elected honorary Life member of the National Commercial Teachers Association.
- Honored at Latin American goodwill luncheon. The Director General of the Pan-American Union presented Gregg a scroll bearing one-thousand signatures of spanish teachers and students.
- 1932 Designated a delegate to the Fifth Triennial Congress of the International Society for Commercial Education.
- Birth of daughter Kate Kinley Gregg
- ca. 1932-37 Twice elected president of the National Arts Club.
- 1933 Business Education World, magazine begins publication under the Gregg Publishing Company.
- 1934 Latin-American, "Dia de Gregg" celebrated at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York City.
- 1935 Birth of son John Robert Gregg, jr.
- 1936 Received gold medal for "Notable Service to the Nation" from the Ulster-Irish Society.
- 1937 Honorary life member of the New York State Shorthand Reporter's Association.
- Canadian Gregg News, magazine begins publication under the Gregg Publication Company.
- 1938 Received award for "Distinguished Service to Education" by the New York Academy of Public Education.
- Golden Jubilee of Gregg Shorthand.
- ca. 1944 Certificate issued by the United States Department of the Navy in recognition for service performed during world war II. Gregg volunteered to decipher enemy coded messages.
- 1946 Awarded the "King George VI Medal, for Service in the Cause of Freedom".

1948, Feb. 23. Died of a heart ailment at age 80, in New York City. John Robert Gregg was survived by his wife Janet and children Kate and John jr.

post 1948 A stamp is issued in his honor from Cuba "Cuba Aereo".

HISTORY OF THE GREGG PUBLISHING COMPANY

The Gregg Publishing Company was established in 1896, in Chicago, Illinois. It evolved from the Light-Line Phonographic Institute founded in 1888, in Liverpool, England by John Robert Gregg.

Prior to this in 1885, Gregg worked on a earlier system of shorthand with Thomas Stratford Malone in Glasgow, Scotland. This shorthand system was based on Duployé, written with the slope of longhand. However, Malone published a pamphlet and claimed sole authorship of Script Phonography. Gregg denied this and proclaimed he was the joint author. Despite the lawsuit which followed between Gregg and Malone, the outcome unclear, Gregg published his first pamphlet in 1888 Light-Line Phonography in Liverpool, England.

In 1893, Gregg left England to take advantage of the Copyright Laws in the United States and to protect Light-Line Phonography, later to be known as Gregg Shorthand. He first opened up a small school, The Boys Institute of Industry, in Boston, Massachusetts, with little success. In 1895, Gregg closed the school and moved to Chicago, where in 1896 he established the Gregg School later to be known as Gregg College. This same year the Gregg Publishing Company was established. Eleven years later in 1908, Gregg moved his headquarters to new York City while retaining the Gregg College in Chicago.

The Gregg Publishing Company maintained numerous branches and interests in the United States and abroad. Domestic branches were located in New York, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Boston and Dallas. Foreign interests included the Gregg Publishing Co. Ltd. incorporated in England in 1925 and the Gregg Schools which numbered approximately 30. Agencies were also located in Great Britain, New England, South Africa, Canada, India and the Philippines. The Company also published magazines under the following titles: Gregg Writer, Business Education World, Gregg News Letter, Gregg News Letter and the Gregg Teacher. The latter two were published in Great Britain.

The functions of the Gregg Publishing Company were diverse. The Company's primary aim was to establish Gregg Shorthand as the leading form of stenography, not only in the United States but in foreign countries as well. This was accomplished by persuading institutions, private, commercial, state or federal to incorporate Gregg Shorthand into their business and educational curriculum. By the time of his death, in 1948, Gregg succeeded in having the majority of United States public schools teach Gregg shorthand.

The Company published books not only in English but in Spanish, Tagalog, French, Polish, Portuguese, Italian, Irish, Esperanto and Russian allowing the Gregg method to be accessible to non-English speaking people. Magazine and advertisements also helped increase visibility. Another important publicity factor was the speed

achieved by Gregg Writers. Winners of different speed contests included Fred Gurtler (1910), Albert Schneider, a world champion (1921), Charles Lee Swem (1923-1924), and Martin J. Dupraw (1925-1926) at speeds not previously seen in any other style of shorthand. This proved the appeal of the Gregg method to business, where time is always a factor.

The success and popularity of Gregg Shorthand is due largely to its unique features. There are: no compulsory thickening - may be either light or heavy; written on the slope of a longhand; position writing abolished; vowels and consonants are joined and angles are rare-curves predominate. John Robert Gregg never failed to acknowledge the early pioneers of shorthand, in his 1934 address "Evolution of the Principles of Shorthand Construction" Gregg states:

"As I was one of those who attempted the solution of the problem of constructing a system that would retain the best features of the system I have mentioned, I wish to do what I have done on so many occasions - acknowledge my indebtedness to the English, French and German authors of shorthand".

It should be noted shorthand and commercial education provided women with an opportunity to enter the business world especially during the lifetime of Gregg. Some achievers were Perle N. Pervis, Margaret Kelecher and Lola McLean. Gregg employees included Florence Ulrich, Circulation Manager Gregg Writer magazine and Frances Effinger Raymond. Other individuals who held positions within the Gregg Publishing Co. include: Guy S. Fry, Secretary-Treasurer, Hubert A. Hagar - General manager, Louis A. Leslie, Henry Jesse Holm - Principal of the Gregg College, and Fred Jarrett - Director of the Gregg College. Abroad at the Gregg Publishing Co. Ltd. employees included: H. L. Carad, B.A., Managing Director, Ernest W. Crockett, Secretary and F. Addington Symonds, General Editor.

In 1948, the Gregg Publishing Company became a subsidiary of the McGraw-Hill Company which continues to publish monographs on Gregg Shorthand using the Gregg name.

SCOPE AND CONTENTS

The John Robert Gregg Collection, span dates 1885-1963, is a broad outline of the Gregg Publishing Company and John Robert Gregg. Since its beginnings Gregg Shorthand has made an significant impact on the business world and today it is considered one of the most utilized shorthand systems in the United States.

The Collection is composed of the Company's records, Light Line Phonography and Gregg's personal file. By size and scope the Gregg Company records dominate the Collection. However, the records are not as complete as it could be, because an international company this size would have generated more material. One explanation is when the Company went defunct in 1948 the records were disposed. Many records prior to 1900 were destroyed in a devastating fire in Gregg's Chicago office and this accounts for the brittle condition of the Light Line Phonography records. Within the Company records there are skips in dates and little or no correspondence from India, Phillipines, Canada and the Gregg branch in Dublin.

The records of the Gregg Publishing Company, 1893-1963 are organized, proceeding with the domestic records, foreign records, documents, writings, galley proofs, printed and related material. The records are divided into correspondence and inter-office communications.

Light-Line Phonography, 1885-97, covers the period before the establishment of the Gregg Publishing Company and the conflict between Thomas S. Malone and Gregg over the authorship of the pamphlet "Script Phonography". The minor overlapping of dates between the Company's records and Light-Line occurs in order to give consistency to a correspondant's letters in the foreign correspondence in the Company records. Also some editions of Light Line Phonography were published after 1895.

Gregg's personal file, 1892-62, consists of documents, correspondence, papers, printed material and photographs reflect his personal life and interests. A detailed description is in the Series Description which follows:

The Gregg Publishing Company span dates 1896-1948 proceeds with Domestic Correspondence 1896-1948, arranged alphabetically. Correspondence to John Robert Gregg, President of the Gregg Publishing Company and employees. Incoming letters by majority are typed and typescripts of replies if available are included. Occasional related inter-office communications. Subjects include manual changes, questions, teaching methods, shorthand styles and business/commercial topics. See index to Domestic Correspondants.

Inter-Office Communications, 1900-48, bulk dates 1932-47.

Arranged chronologically. Communications between different domestic branches in the United States. Bulk of communications is between New York and Chicago, some from San Francisco, none from Dallas. John Robert Gregg was the main recipient but some were also to his employees. This includes Louis A. Leslie, W.W. Renshaw and Rupert P. Sorelle. Subjects include those mentioned in Domestic Correspondence and also the Panama-Pacific International Exposition 1915, thefts, staff problems and references to printed material.

Foreign Correspondence, 1893-1977. Arranged alphabetically.

Correspondence to John Robert Gregg, President of the Gregg Publishing Company and employees. Description is similar to Domestic Correspondence. Correspondants countries include Canada, Cuba, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy and Sweden. Subjects include translating Gregg Shorthand into foreign languages. See index of Foreign Correspondants.

Foreign Branches. Inter-Office Communications, 1896-1947,

bulk dates 1920-47. Arranged chronologically. Correspondence from Canadian branch, Gregg Publishing Company Ltd. and Gregg Schools in Great Britain. Early correspondence is from South Africa ca. 1896-1905 and the Debear Schools Ltd. ca. 1920-25 not exclusively. The DeBear Schools Ltd. became the Gregg Schools ca. 1926. Correspondence of Bernard Debear regarding the negotiations for the sale of the DeBear Schools Ltd. Employees of the Gregg Publishing Company Ltd. include H.L. Carrad - Managing Director; Ernest W. Crockett - Secretary. Broad subjects include those in domestic records excluding the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

Financial Documents and Papers 1902-47. Arranged alphabetically. Accounts 1913-47 of the Gregg Publishing Company Ltd. and accounts of the Gregg Publishing Company 1913-47.

Legal Documents and Papers 1900-43. Arranged alphabetically. Documents include agreements and copyrights of the Gregg Publishing Company.

Writings - Drafts 1901-48;n.d. Arranged chronologically. Drafts of ~~manuscript~~ typescripts published or considered for publications. Some drafts are annotated, not all are complete. There are missing page numbers, title pages and dates. When possible drafts where John Robert Gregg style appeared, it was attributed to him or the Gregg Publishing Company.

Galley Proofs ca. 1920-22. Galley Proofs are arranged according to the numbers assigned to them by the Gregg Publishing Company. Identification is simplified with this arrangement. Galley Proofs are cardboard prepared for publication. Not all Galley Proofs are identifiable for lack of information. Many are for articles in the Gregg Writer, magazine 1920-22, some for book publication. All appear to have been published. Included with Galley Proofs are some rejected manuscripts. Galley Proofs lack page numbers so an fixed order cannot be determined.

The printed material, 1890-63, of the Gregg Publishing Company is not an complete record of all material published. Post 1948 is published by the McGraw-Hill Company. Printed Material proceeds with Advertisements, Handbills and Leaflets 1900-47;n.d. Arranged chronologically. Published material used to advertise the Company. This was probably mailed to subscribers or passed out in the streets.

Monographs, Periodicals 1904-53. Arranged alphabetically. Published material issued periodically, monthly and quarterly.

Pamphlets 1903-52;n.d. Published pamphlets of the Company.

Books 1899-44;63. Arranged chronologically. Books on Gregg Shorthand and related subjects, by Gregg and others. The earliest book is Gregg's Shorthand. 7th ed. published 1893 in Chicago. Gregg Shorthand in foreign languages books include Gaelic, Spanish and Polish.

Other related material is Charts, 1918-20, which shows statistics of shorthand systems taught in Catholic schools, private and commercial schools. Diplomas are blanks which were never issued. Posters c. 1896-1938, were used to advertise Gregg Shorthand both in the United States and abroad. See container and folder listing for above.

Light-Line Phonography, 1885-97, Correspondence 1885-95, is correspondence only in Great Britain. Letters include references to conflict between Gregg and Thomas Stratford Malone over copyright shorthand invention. Legal Documents and Papers, 1886-89, include affidavits, opinions and summons regarding suit between Malone and Gregg. Other documents are copyrights and incorporation Act. Drafts and Notes are in regard to court case of Malone vs. Gregg. Printed Material consists of Advertisements, Handbills and Leaflets, n.d. Pamphlets 1887-97 and books 1887-97. This is the original published material of Light Line Phonography. See Container and folder listing.

John Robert Gregg's personal file, 1892-1963, proceeds with Personal Documents and Papers, 1898-1952. Documents include his financial and legal affairs which include bank books, diplomas, investments and the estate papers of Gregg (deceased) last will and testament.

Correspondence is divided into Personal correspondence and Associations. Personal Correspondence, 1907-62, bulk dates 1947. Arranged chronologically. Personal family correspondence 1907-08 are letters from Gregg relations e.g. cousins. His other personal correspondants include correspondants Faith Baldwin, Harry Woodburn Chase and Dorothy Dix. See index to Prominent Correspondants.

Associations and Clubs, 1901-47. Arranged alphabetically. Associations and Clubs are outside interests of Gregg. Some associations are related to his career as shorthand educator others to his ethnic, social and community involvements. Four organizations of great importance to Gregg are the International Society of Commercial Education who's goal was to promote commercial/business education. The National Arts Club which

promotes literary, performing and fine arts. The National Shorthand Reporter's Association. The N.S.R.A. was involved in acquiring shorthand collections and transferring them over to the New York Public Library. According to d. April 7, 1931 letter, Gregg states this action was begun when the N.S.R.A. purchased the later Charles Currier Beale Collection and deposited it in the N.Y.P.L. As a result of this the N.Y.P.L. with the help of the N.S.R.A. has become a major repository of shorthand collections e.g. David O'keefe, Julius Ensign Rockell. Later correspondence in N.S.R.A. 1940-48, focuses on Clyde Marshall a member who claimed that some members were using the N.S.R.A. for their own purposes.

Finally, the Willis-Byron Club founded by Charles Currier Beale. The Club is named after two shorthand inventors John Willis and John Byrom. It issued privately printed works on shorthand, its history and literature. "Baileyana" was the first edition issued in 1903 and it is available in Gregg's personal file of printed material. Correspondence 1901-06 are letters to Charles Currier Beale, John Gregg and others. Overlapping of correspondants occurs because individuals were members of both the N.S.R.A. and the Willis-Byrom Club.

Writings are divided into three parts, proceeding with Addresses and Papers/articles, 1893-1948 of John R. Gregg. Arranged chronologically. Addresses and Papers/articles of others, arranged by author. Subjects by majority are related to business/commercial education and there are one or two biographies of Gregg.

Writings-Drafts. Arranged by author. Drafts of typescripts and manuscripts which were not or could not be attributed to the Gregg Publishing Company.

Writings-Notes, arranged by subject. Shorthand notes and some notebooks kept by Gregg regarding topics e.g. the anniversary edition, chapter for publications and word or phrases in shorthand.

Scrapbooks, 1888-1938;n.d. arranged chronologically. Scrapbooks subjects include club activities and the Golden Jubilee 1888-1938. This contains letters of tribute and ephemera in honor of John Robert Gregg and Gregg Shorthand. (located in Box 180 and outside).

Printed Material 1885-47 is material not published by the Gregg Publishing Company or John R. Gregg. However, this material is part of Gregg's personal library. It is a sampling of other business/commercial establishments and shorthand systems. Newspaper Clippings, 1903-42, arranged by subject. Periodicals Clippings, 1886-48, arranged by subject. Advertisements, Handbills and Leaflets, arranged alphabetically. c. 1890-47. Monographs/Periodicals, c. 1885-57, arranged alphabetically. Material which was issued periodically, monthly and quarterly.

Pamphlets, arranged alphabetically. Books arranged by author or title. Books are especially interesting for it reflects a range of shorthand systems both domestic and foreign and also business education. Some books are published in foreign languages.

Posters. Several posters c. 1900-40 used to advertise business/commercial interests other than the Gregg Publishing Company.

Miscellany. Miscellaneous song sheets and a watercolor of Janet Gregg and child. Also a small container of 3-D plate, viopticon glass slides.

Photographs are the last part of the collection. Photographs c. 1868-1948, are grouped according to size and subject. Box 181 are snapshots to 12"x12" of Gregg alone or with others, including his wife and children Kate and John jr. Box 182 contains photographs of other individuals. Box 183 contains photographs of outdoor scenes, still life and other similar subjects. Photographs over 12"x 12" are group or crowd scenes, often with Gregg. All photographs are in black and white. Large oversize photographs are located in Charter drawer 1 (184).

Biographical statement: John Robert Gregg (1868-1948) was an inventor of shorthand, educator and the founder of the Gregg Publishing Co. The company was established in 1893 in Chicago; Gregg moved the headquarters to New York City between 1907-1908. Eventually, he established branches throughout the United States and Canada. Gregg also established the Gregg Publishing Co. Ltd., a separate company, in England in 1925. Around 1922, Gregg bought the DeBear School Ltd. and renamed it Gregg Schools Ltd., Great Britain. In 1948, the Gregg Publishing Co. and its other holdings were sold to the McGraw-Hill Company and it became their subsidiary. The McGraw-Hill Publishing Co. has continued to published monographs on Gregg Shorthand.

Description: The additions to the papers (1623-1980) reflect Gregg's career as an inventor, educator and publisher. The additions are arranged into two sections: personal papers (1623-1980) of John Robert Gregg and his wife Janet; and also the Gregg Publishing Co. records (1893-1980). There are also a few records of Light-Line Phonography Co. (1889-1892).

JOHN ROBERT GREGG. PAPERS (ADDITIONS)

BIOGRAPHY

John Robert Gregg (1868-1948) was an inventor of Gregg Shorthand, educator, and publisher. He was born on June 17, 1867, in Monaghan, Ireland, the middle of five children of Robert and Margaret Gregg. At his father's insistence, Gregg and his siblings learned shorthand. This situation developed because Robert Gregg had a friend who was adept at Isaac Pitman Phonography. During Gregg's childhood, Pitman shorthand was the system most utilized by shorthand writers in Great Britain. Impressed, Robert Gregg felt all of his children would benefit from this skill. However, except for John Gregg the children quickly became disinterested with shorthand. Gregg learned the Pitman shorthand system and he also taught himself other European shorthand systems such as the Odell system (an adaption of Samuel Taylor Shorthand), the Sloan-Duployé System and the Pernin System (two adaptations of Emile Duployé's System) and Gabelsberger system (German shorthand).

After having mastered these shorthand systems, Gregg was most impressed with the Duployé system because of its script alphabet. Unlike the widely used Pitman shorthand which based its system upon a geometric alphabet, Duployé's shorthand was based upon cursive or longhand.

Gregg was of the opinion that he could improve upon the shorthand systems used during the late 19th century. He believed that Duployé shorthand was the most impressive system because of its non-shading and natural shorthand strokes, although, to Gregg, Duployé was somewhat awkward to utilize. After emigrating from Ireland to Liverpool, England (1887), Gregg began to develop his own shorthand system. For a time, Gregg collaborated with a fellow shorthand writer, Thomas Stratford Malone, on a system called Script. Unfortunately, the differences were too great between the two men about how this system should be developed. Malone published and copyrighted Script (1885), without consulting Gregg and he also took full credit for developing Script. (Malone's actions led to even deeper problems between Gregg and himself, as discussed below).

Undaunted, Gregg continued to experiment with shorthand on his own. Gregg borrowed elements from the English, French and German shorthand systems, and he developed his own unique system. This system was called Light-Line Phonography. On May 28, 1888, the first pamphlet Light-Line Phonography was published and copyrighted. The elements that Light-Line Phonography contained were: light line, absence of shading, absence of position writing, connective vowels and the slant of longhand instead of the short

strokes of Pitman Shorthand. The elements of this new system surpassed the shorthand systems in use during the late 19th Century. Perhaps the most dramatic result of this new system was that the user's speed increased. Over the years, Gregg Shorthand has produced numerous shorthand winners at speed competitions.

By 1887, Gregg and Malone separated professionally. On several occasions, Malone attempted to appropriate the Light-Line System developed by Gregg through plagiarism and copyright infringement. This culminated in legal action by Malone who filed a lawsuit against Gregg for plagiarism. The judge dismissed the Script case with cost against Malone (1890). After this decision, Gregg was free to concentrate on the development of Light-Line. He believed his system would revolutionize shorthand. His efforts paid off. By 1892, the news of Light-Line had spread to London and the surrounding counties. In 1893, Gregg took over the magazine Light-Line because the manager, Ridsdale Blake, was unable to maintain it. He renamed it Light-Liner and he utilized this publication to further the Light-Line system.

In 1893, Gregg emigrated from England to the United States. Gregg's business horizons were expanding and the move to the United States would open up a new generation of shorthand writers. It should be noted that around this time the name Light-Line was changed to Gregg Shorthand.

Gregg in America

Gregg's first stop after he arrived in the United States was in Boston, Massachusetts. After Gregg settled in Boston, he taught his first class in shorthand at the Boy's Institute of Industry and he also published the first American edition of Gregg Shorthand. Part one: The elements (1893). On the recommendation of a colleague, Dr. Louis Pfeiffer, Gregg relocated to Chicago in 1895. With seventy-five dollars in his pocket, Gregg opened up an office known as The Gregg Institute at 94 Washington Street (1896). (The name was eventually changed to the Gregg College.) During this same year, Gregg established a separate publishing company, the Gregg Publishing Co. It should be also be recognized that Gregg Shorthand continued to grow in popularity in Great Britain, and it was slowly being taught as an alternative shorthand alongside the Pitman system. Gregg encouraged women and girls to learn shorthand and for many women this was their first opportunity to enter the business world.

In 1898, Gregg published his first bound monograph titled Gregg Shorthand. This monograph was the beginning of the multitude of pamphlets, serials and monographs published by Gregg. Gregg established the Gregg Publishing Co. in Chicago (1900). He eventually shifted the headquarters to New York City (1907-1908).

Over the years, the Gregg Publishing Co. continued to expand; branches were established throughout the United States and in Canada. A separate company, Gregg Publishing Ltd. was established in England (1925). In the early 1920's, Gregg brought the DeBear Schools Ltd. and renamed it Gregg Schools Ltd., Great Britain.

As of this writing, it is still used by secretaries and it is highly preferred over the Pitman Shorthand system. Inter-Office Correspondence, 1920-1954; 9. Financial and Legal Papers; 10. Drafts of Publications; 11. Printed Material; 12. Artifacts; 13. Photoprints; 14. Sound Recordings; 15. Motion Pictures.

SCOPE AND CONTENTS

The additions to the papers (1623-1980, 36 linear ft.), reflect Gregg's career as an inventor, educator, and publisher primarily between the years 1920-1948. The additions are arranged into two sections: personal papers of John Robert Gregg and his wife Janet, and also the records of the Gregg Publishing Co. (1908-1980). There are a few records of Light-Line Phonography Co. (1889-1892).

The personal papers contain the personal correspondence of John Robert Gregg (1908-1947) and his wife Janet (1932-1980). The correspondence is reflective of the many friends and colleagues Gregg and his wife Janet had throughout and outside of the United States. This is especially evident in Janet Gregg's correspondence (1948), after the death of John Robert Gregg. She received letters of condolence from around the world. Separate material in the personal papers is an Oral History Project (1954-1955), conducted by Columbia University. John Robert Gregg was the subject of this oral history. Participants in the project were Janet Gregg and their mutual friends. The remainder of the personal correspondence is unrelated letters (1948-1950) of Georgia Gregg Gingell (Gregg's niece), and unrelated letters (1902-1908) of Charles Currier Beale.

As a highly prized speaker, Gregg was often sought by businesses and commercial organizations to address their meetings. Gregg's comments and insights on the business world were highly thought of. Gregg was also interested in the ideas of his predecessors and contemporaries with regard to business, commercial education, and shorthand systems. These points are reflected in the writings. It should be noted that the additions contain only a fraction of the addresses, articles and papers published and delivered by Gregg. Besides being a prolific speaker, Gregg assiduously kept diaries, notes and notebooks during most of his adult life. Especially significant are the diaries (1929-1947) written in Gregg Shorthand.

Strongly related to the diaries are the scrapbooks. The scrapbooks in part are autobiographical. The other scrapbooks contain a testimonial to Gregg's lifetime achievements and are also complemented by separate testimonials and diplomas.

As stated earlier, Gregg's interest in business, commercial education and shorthand extended beyond his own company. The printed material, retained by Gregg over the years, demonstrates his interest in various shorthand systems (both well known and obscure), and his colleagues' business procedures. For example, the monographs include a copy of Thomas Anderson's History of the Shorthand (1882). Anderson's monograph is one of Gregg's earliest and favorite readings.

The Light-Line Phonography records represent the period before Gregg established the Gregg Publishing Co. Very few of the records generated during the late 19th Century to the early 20th Century have survived. Fortunately, the records contain the first issue of the pamphlet Light-Line Phonography (1888), incomplete letter-press copies (1888-1889) of Gregg's outgoing letters, and the serial Light-Liner & Typist (1897).

The Gregg Publishing Co. Records (1893-1980), are the corporate records of the company. The records include correspondence (General Correspondence 1893-1949, and Inter-Office Correspondence 1920-1954), financial papers, legal papers, drafts and printed material. The correspondence shows an active and dynamic company developing and expanding through its various branches and schools. During the 1900's to 1920's, when the Gregg Publishing Co. was establishing itself, Gregg Shorthand was taught in classrooms alongside competing shorthand systems (especially a variation of Pitman Shorthand). It is evident from the incoming letters both in the general correspondence from the public and the inter-office correspondence within the company, that Gregg Shorthand held its own place. The inter-office correspondence contains memos and reports which were passed vigorously between Gregg and his employees discussing this issues and other subjects such as staff problems, budgets and the revision of the Gregg shorthand manuals. The financial papers and legal papers represent only a smattering of the total amount of documents generated by this company. Presumably many non-active documents were not retained by the company. The Drafts are an assortment of pre-publications monographs.

The Gregg Publishing Co. published a large volume of material. As the company expanded over the years, so did the amount of material published. Gregg was the author of most of the publications; however, he did publish his employees' and other Gregg Shorthand experts' writings on Gregg Shorthand. Unlike the printed material in Gregg's personal papers which comes from disparate sources, the Gregg Publishing Co. printed material is focused mainly on Gregg Shorthand. The printed material is a fairly complete representation of the different types of published materials such as advertisements, handbills, leaflets, serials, pamphlets and monographs.

The Audio Visual material (photographs, sound recordings and motion pictures), contains the visual images as well as the spoken words of John Gregg. This material is personal but it also contains some professional aspects of Gregg's career. The motion pictures (recorded on 16 mm film), shows the Gregg family on holidays and vacations in the United States and abroad (1934-1946). The film may be the most complete visual record of Gregg.

These additions complement the personal papers and the Gregg Publishing Co. records in the John Robert Gregg Collection.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

Series 1. John Robert Gregg. Personal Correspondence (Container no. 1)

The Personal Correspondence, 1908-1947, is chronological in its arrangement. The correspondence is mainly incoming letters to Gregg from friends and colleagues. There are a few typescript replies. The correspondence reflects Gregg's interests, particularly in his business career.

Series 2. Janet Kinley Gregg Howell. Personal Correspondence (Container nos. 1-6). Oral History Project (Container no. 6)

The Personal Correspondence 1932-1980, is chronological in its arrangement. The correspondence is mainly incoming letters to Mrs. Howell. There are a few typescript replies. The bulk of the correspondence is condolences (1948) following the death of her first husband John Robert Gregg. Sympathy letters, cards and telegrams were mailed from around the world.

The Oral History Project (1954-1955), was conducted by Columbia University. It is a compilation of interviews with friends and associates of John Robert Gregg (1867-1948). The participants were Faith Baldwin, Guy S. Fry, W.W. Lewis, Louis Pfeiffer, and joint interviews with Mrs. Janet K. Gregg Howell, Mrs. Margaret Richards Shimko and Charles Lee Swem.

Also included are materials pertaining to Georgia Gregg Gingells (Gregg's niece) 1948-1950, and also Charles Currier Beale 1902-1908.

Series 3. Writings (Container nos. 7-12)

The Writings contribute the most insight into Gregg's thoughts and ideas because of these distinct types of materials: addresses, notes, notebooks and diaries. The writings are arranged into three sections. Section 1: Addresses, articles and Papers. Section 1 is arranged into two parts. Part 1 contains addresses, articles and papers by John Robert Gregg. It is chronological in its arrangement. Part 2 contains addresses, articles and papers by others. It is arranged alphabetically by the author.

Section 2: Notes and Notebooks. The arrangement is by subject. The subjects are mainly Gregg Shorthand and shorthand history. A small portion of the notes are personal in nature and miscellaneous. **Section 3: Diaries 1929-1947 (20 volumes).** The arrangement is chronological. The diaries are written in Gregg Shorthand and they present a daily record of Gregg's thoughts.

Series 4. Scrapbooks, Tributes, Testimonials and Diplomas
(Container no. 16 and one drawer in map case)

Series 4 is arranged into two sections. **Section 1: Scrapbooks 1899-1938.** The subjects of the scrapbooks are autobiographical by Gregg, the Story of Gregg Shorthand, and a Tribute to Gregg. The tribute scrapbooks (1938, 2 volumes), were presented as gifts to John Robert Gregg in honor of the Gregg Shorthand anniversary celebration. One volume is a collection of congratulatory letters sent to Gregg from his Spanish speaking students in the Caribbean, Central and South America. The other volume is a collection of typed notes inserted into identical illustrations from the students at the Immaculate Conception Girls Commercial School, Bronx, New York. **Section 2: Tributes, Testimonials and Diplomas** attest to Gregg's contribution towards commercial education and the business world.

Series 5. Printed Material (Container nos. 17-26)

This series contains printed material that was not published by the Gregg Publishing Co. The printed material is arranged by type into five sections. Within each of these sections the arrangement varies. The printed material reflects the other types of business and commercial material collected by Gregg. The sections are as follows: **Section 1: Advertisements, Handbills & leaflets 1886-1963.** It is chronological in its arrangement. **Section 2: Clippings 1885-1911.** The arrangement is by subject. **Section 3: Serials.** The arrangement is by the type of serial followed by chronological order. **Section 4: Pamphlets.** The arrangement is by title. **Section 5: Monographs.** The arrangement is by author or title.

Note: Consult the index list for the pamphlets and monographs.

Series 6. Light-Line Phonography. Records (Container no. 27)

The records, 1888-1897, consist of miscellaneous letters, 1888, letter press copies of Gregg outgoing letter 1887-1889 (2 volumes), and printed material. The letter press copies are

incomplete. The location of Parts 1 and 2 is unknown. (Researchers should note that the ink on the letter press copies is extremely faded and difficult to read.) The printed material includes the first edition and subsequent editions of Light-Line Phonography (1888).

Series 7. Gregg Publishing Co. Records. General Correspondence
(Container no. 28)

The General Correspondence, 1893-1910, is chronological in its arrangement. The correspondence is mainly incoming to John Robert Gregg, President of the Gregg Publishing Co. There are a few typescript replies. The correspondents include educators, businessmen, businesswomen, secretaries and students who had an interest in Gregg Shorthand or individuals who had established a commercial or business relationship with Gregg. The subjects include suggestions on how to improve Gregg Shorthand, comments on the manuals, their personal experience with Gregg Shorthand or rival shorthand systems, and miscellaneous requests.

Series 8. Gregg Publishing Co. Records. Inter-Office Correspondence (Containers nos. 29-32)

The Inter-Office Correspondence, 1920-1954, is chronological in its arrangement. The inter-office correspondence contains letters and memos mainly between John Robert Gregg, the President of the Gregg Publishing Co., and his management team. To a lesser extent, there is some correspondence between Janet Gregg and the management team (1947-1949), after she assumed the position of President of the company following Gregg's death in 1948. This later correspondence includes the sale of the Gregg Publishing Co. to McGraw-Hill Publishing Co. There is also a limited exchange of correspondence between the Gregg Publishing Co. (United States) and the Gregg Publishing Co. Ltd. (London). Subjects discussed in the inter-office correspondence include: changes and improvements to the Gregg manuals and related publications, employee problems, competition from rival shorthand systems, comparative sales reports (1930-1948), financial planning (1937-1942), general merchandise sales reports (1936-1942), general operating statements (1902-1927), and royalty reports (1910-1946). Notable correspondents who were employed by the Gregg Publishing Co. include Hubert A. Hagar, General Manager; Guy S. Fry, Secretary Treasurer; Louis A. Leslie, author; and Ernest W. Crockett, Manager of the Gregg Publishing Co. Ltd. (London).

Series 9. Gregg Publishing Co. Records. Financial Papers and Legal Papers (Container nos. 32-33)

The Financial Papers, 1916-1947, consist of tax returns, balance sheets and miscellaneous accounts. The Legal Papers,

1901-1948, consist of agreements, articles of incorporation, copyrights, and the sale of certain assets to McGraw-Hill Publishing Co.

Series 10. Gregg Publishing Co. Records. Writings (Container nos. 34-39)

The Writings, 1899-1947, consist mainly of incomplete drafts of Gregg Shorthand manuals. The arrangement is by author.

Series 11. Gregg Publishing Co. Records. Printed Material (Container nos. 40-66)

The Printed Material, 1897-1963, is arranged by type into four sections. Within each of these sections the arrangement is either chronological or alphabetical by author or title. The printed material mainly reflects the Gregg Shorthand business material published by the Gregg Publishing Co. The sections are arranged as follows: **Section 1:** Advertisements, Handbills and Leaflets, 1923-1973, (the arrangement is chronological). **Section 2:** Serials (the arrangement is alphabetical by serial). **Section 3:** Pamphlets, 1897-1963, (the arrangement is chronological). **Section 4:** Monographs (the arrangement is by author or title).

The printed material includes many of the publications available to the public via purchase or subscription during the 1900-1940's. A few of the publications represent Gregg Shorthand published in other languages (for example French, Spanish, Russian and Irish Celtic). The publications include: The American Shorthand Teacher 1920- (serial), Gregg Writer 1899- (serial), and the monographs Gregg Shorthand (several versions), and Analysis Gregg-Script Study by Louis A. Leslie (1943).

Note: The index for the Gregg Publishing Co. monographs is located at the end of the inventory. Many of these monographs are available in the General Research Division (Room 315). Consult the General Dictionary Catalog.

Series 12. Artifacts. (Container nos. 67-69)

The Artifacts are primarily tributes to John Robert Gregg for his contributions to commercial and business education. The artifacts include a wood plaque, engraved plates and an oil painting (scroll).

Note: Consult Series 4 : Scrapbooks; tributes, testimonials and diplomas in conjunction with Series 12.

Series 13. Photographs (Container no. 70)

The photographs, 1923-1940, are pictures of John Robert Gregg taken alone or with his family or at conferences and meetings in the United States and the United Kingdom. Miscellaneous photographs include pictures of others and a photograph album of the Gregg School (Liverpool, England 1946).

Series 14. Sound Recordings (Container nos. 71-72)

The Sound Recordings are phonodiscs, 1938-1946, with recordings of John Robert Gregg, and audio tapes (reel-to-reel) that contain an interview with John Robert Gregg in 1946 and also reminiscences about Gregg by his wife Janet and their friends.

Note: Cassette tapes must be used in place of the reel-to-reel tapes.

Series 12. Motion Pictures (Container no. 73)

The motion pictures are 16mm silent film of home movies recorded either by John or Janet Gregg during the period 1934-1940.
