**Abstract:** The papers of poet and teacher Genevieve Taggard include correspondence, drafts of poetry and prose (most notably for her 1930 book The Life and Mind of Emily Dickinson), photographs, notebooks, teaching materials, memorabilia, and other personal and professional materials. The papers also have several audio recordings of Taggard reading her poems. In addition, the collection holds correspondence and writings of her first husband, Robert L. Wolf, her daughter, Marcia Durant Liles, and her parents and siblings. Materials compiled by her second husband, Kenneth Durant, in his attempt at creating a comprehensive bibliography of Taggard's published works, are also included.

#### Custodial history

Kenneth Durant began donating Taggard's papers to the New York Public Library in 1952 and appears to have done so sporadically for the next two decades, until his death in 1972. Many of her papers are annotated in his hand. When he died, his widow donated additional materials related to his compilation of the Taggard bibliography. In 2010, Judith Benét Richardson donated a significant amount of additional material, most notably the papers of Robert L. Wolf and other members of the Taggard family.

### **Processing note**

Due to the sporadic nature in which additions were made to the collection between 1952 and 1972, as well as the presence of a significant number of photostat and xerox copies of archival materials held by other repositories, the integration of materials donated in 2010 required physical and intellectual rearrangement of the collection as a whole and the discard of non-original materials. Series were created for each individual represented in the collection, and materials were arranged alphabetically by genre within those series. When possible, existing folder titles were maintained, and dates were added to assist researchers in using the collection.

#### Creator history

Genevieve Irene Taggard (1894-1948) was born on November 28, 1894 in Waitsburg, Washington. Her parents, Alta Gail Taggard and James Nelson Taggard, were both school teachers and missionaries of the Campbellite sect. At the age of two, she moved with her family to Hawaii, where she studied at the Punahou Preparatory School. She was the oldest of three siblings, with a sister, Ernestine, and brother, Norman. In 1910 the family returned to Waitsburg, where Genevieve attended high school and was an editor for the school paper. In 1912 the family briefly returned to Hawaii.

Taggard entered the University of California at Berkeley in 1914, and her mother operated a boarding

house there to provide income for the family. She graduated in 1919 and served as editor at the student literary journal, The Occident, from 1918 to 1920. During that time she began moving in the Socialist literary circles of San Francisco. In June of 1920 Taggard moved to New York, where she worked for the publishing house of modernist B.W. Huebsch (founder of The Freeman) and helped found and edit the journal The Measure: A Journal of Verse with Maxwell Anderson and Padraic Colum. She was an editor at The Measure until 1926 and active in the Greenwich Village radical bohemian literary scene. Although primarily concerned with domestic issues at that time, Taggard considered herself a Socialist. Many of her poems protested social injustice, and she became affiliated with organizations on the political left. She remained closely associated with the Communist Party throughout her adult life.

On March 21, 1921, Taggard married fellow writer Robert L. Wolf, with whom she had a daughter, Mary Alta (Marcia) Wolf, born December 13, 1921. She returned to California for several years, living in and around San Francisco until 1923, when she returned east to New Preston, Connecticut. In 1926 she moved back to New York City. Taggard's first book of verse, For Eager Lovers, was published in 1922 and was praised by many critics, including Edmund Wilson, but she failed to gain widespread recognition until another collection of poems, Traveling Standing Still, was published in 1928.

Taggard published numerous books of poetry, including Hawaiian Hilltop (1923), Words for the Chisel (1926), Monologue for Mothers (1929), Remembering Vaughan in New England (1933), Not Mine to Finish (1934), Calling Western Union (1936), Collected Poems: 1918-1938 (1938), Long View (1942), Falcon (1942), A Part of Vermont (1945), Slow Music (1946) and Origin: Hawaii (1947). She also edited May Days: An Anthology of Verse from the Masses and the Liberator (1925) and Circumference: Varieties of Metaphysical Verse (1929). Her poems, essays, short stories, reviews, and criticism were published in numerous journals, including: Asia, The Bookman, New Republic, Voices, The Dial, Poetry, The Nation, The Masses, Literary Digest, Century Magazine, Harper's, The Lyric West, The Measure: A Journal of Poetry, Christian Science Monitor, The Saturday Review and The Liberator. The work for which she is best known, however, is a biography, The Life and Mind of Emily Dickinson, first published in 1930 and reprinted in 1934.

In the 1930s Taggard became a contributing editor of the Marxist journal The New Masses, in which she published poems, reviews, and articles. Her poetry during this time explored political subject matter, including race and class prejudice, labor strikes, and the elitism of poetry as a practice. Her political views are expressed in poems in Calling Western Union, which concern marble workers in Vermont, and Falcon, which celebrate the heroism of the Soviet people.

From 1931 to 1932 Taggard held a Guggenheim Fellowship which enabled her to live and write in Capri and Mallorca, accompanied by her daughter and sister. She was divorced from Robert L. Wolf in 1934 and married Kenneth Durant the next year, on March 10, 1935. They remained married until her death. In addition to writing, Taggard was also a teacher. She taught courses in poetry and writing at Mount Holyoke College (1929-1931), Bennington College (1932-1935) and at Sarah Lawrence College (1935-1946). In 1946, she retired from teaching and moved permanently to Gilfeather, her home in Vermont. From 1946 to 1948 she served on the editorial board of the Young People's Record Club.

Taggard was interested in both radio and musical performances as forums for poetry, and on many occasions read her poems over the air and wrote for music. On April 13, 1943, her poem "Lark," set to music by Aaron Copland, was performed at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Taggard's poems have been translated into many foreign languages and set to music not only by Copland but also by William Schuman, Roy Harris, and Henry Leland Clarke.

Genevieve Taggard died in New York City of complications from high blood pressure on November 8, 1848, just before her fifty-fourth birthday.

### Scope and content note

The Genevieve Taggard papers contain personal correspondence, correspondence with publishers, drafts of poetry and prose, photographs and drawings, teaching materials, subject files, journals and notebooks, and notes for various public talks and radio broadcasts. Included are several audio recordings of Taggard reading her poetry. The collection also holds papers of Taggard's first husband, the writer Robert L. Wolf; her daughter, Marcia Durant Liles; her second husband, Kenneth Durant; and her parents and siblings, Alta, James, Ernestine, and Norman Taggard. The scope and content of materials in the collection are described more extensively at the series level in this finding aid.

Of particular note in Taggard's papers are research materials, drafts, and galley proofs of her 1930 book The Life and Mind of Emily Dickinson, as well as her personal correspondence, which includes letters to and from many important figures in 20th century American literature, personal friends, family, and academic colleagues. Among Taggard's most frequent correspondents were Maeve Butler Beck, William Rose Benét, Mary Lapsley Caughey, Max Eastman, Sara Bard Field and Charles Erskine Scott Wood, Josephine Herbst, Rolfe Humphries, J. J. Lankes, James (Jim) Neugass, George Sterling, and Louis Untermeyer. Also of note are letters from Van Wyck Brooks, Alexander Calder, Ernest Hemingway, and Paul Strand, as well as correspondence with publishers and letters from readers.

In addition, the collection contains teaching notes Taggard used while a professor at Mount Holyoke, Bennington, and Sarah Lawrence Colleges.

### Series I: Genevieve Taggard, 1909-1976 (33 boxes)

This series - the most extensive in the collection - includes correspondence (personal, professional, and concerning published works), papers related to Taggard's editorial work, journals and notebooks, legal documents, memorabilia, musical scores, poetry and prose (ranging from handwritten drafts to published work), transcripts and notes for radio broadcasts, and teaching materials. Materials are arranged alphabetically by format.

Correspondence comprises much of the series and includes letters to and from friends. family, colleagues, and publishers, as well as letters concerning two of Taggard's published works: The Life and Mind of Emily Dickinson and A Part of Vermont. Many important figures in 20th century American literary and publishing circles numbered among her correspondents, including Katherine Anne Porter, Carl Sandburg, Wallace Stevens, William Rose Benét, Louise Bogan, Louis Untermeyer, Erskine Caldwell, Charles Erskine Scott Wood, Josephine Herbst, Max Eastman, Grace Hazard Conkling, Ernest Hemingway, Sara Bard Field, Rolfe Humphries, Floyd Dell, George Sterling, Ernst Waldinger, and Van Wyck Brooks. Of particular note are letters from British writer Sylvia Townsend Warner about World War II which describe its effects on her daily life and perceptions. Taggard also corresponded with artists Alexander Calder, Paul Strand and Andrée Ruellan. Her correspondence with publishers includes that with small, literary journals as well as larger and more mainstream publishing houses, and through these letters one may better understand the reception of Taggard's work in her own time. Researchers should note that some folders also contain Kenneth Durant's correspondence with the individual, as he solicited letters to add to the collection from friends and colleagues following Taggard's death.

Journals and notebooks in this series range from Taggard's childhood friendship book to the notebooks in which she later kept ideas for writing and teaching projects. Legal documents include various iterations of her will, marriage certificates and a bill of divorce, publishing contacts and permissions records, two passports, and a certificate of death. Memorabilia includes a lock of hair sent to Taggard, a press pass to the 1939 World's Fair in New York, ration books issued during World War II, and various cards, certificates, bookplates, and book jackets.

Also in this series are musical scores, in which Taggard's poetry was set to music, as well as programs from events at which these pieces were performed. In addition, there are drafts of many of Taggard's poems and prose pieces, including extensive research notes, drafts, and galley proofs of her best known work, The Life and Mind of Emily Dickinson. Taggard published numerous book reviews, essays, and translations, and drafts of many of those works are in this series.

The series includes newspaper and journal clippings about Taggard and her work, as well as obituaries and memorials. There are notes and transcripts for radio broadcasts, one of her preferred means of public reading, and teaching materials created during her tenure at Mt. Holyoke, Bennington, and Sarah Lawrence Colleges. Taggard organized these files by topic - often an individual poet - and they contain lecture notes and outlines, suggested reading lists, and some student work.

The wide range of materials in this series documents Taggard's adult life, as manifested through the roles of poet and writer, editor, teacher, mother, wife, and politically minded citizen, as well as some of her childhood experiences. Her correspondence provides an understanding of the ways in which her personal relationships influenced her work, and vice versa, and drafts and research notes provide insight into her mind and writing process.

#### Series II: Robert L. Wolf, 1907-1929, 1960 (6 boxes)

Robert Leopold Wolf (1895-1970) was born in Chicago, Illinois on January 10, 1895 to Carrie Mendelbaum Wolf and Leopold Jacob Wolf. He was the older of two sons, with a younger brother James ("Bibs"), and his father was a partner in the firm of Mandelbaum, Wolf, and Lang, innovators in electric inter-urban railroads. Wolf prepared at University School in Cleveland, Ohio before entering Harvard College in 1911. He was awarded a scholarship for two years, served as President of the Harvard Equal Suffrage League in 1914-1915, and excelled at mathematics, economics, and writing. He graduated summa cum laude in 1915 and worked as a statistical clerk at the American Telephone and Telegraph Company (AT & T) from 1915-1916.

Wolf married Anne Page on April 8, 1916 and was an assistant instructor in economics at Harvard from 1916 to 1917. Their daughter, Barbara Page Wolf, was born on December 23, 1917. Wolf attended Columbia Law School for a semester in 1918 before joining the United States Army. From March 1918 to July 1919 he was stationed in France as an artillery officer with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant, and from August 1919 to March 1920 he worked for the U. S. Tariff Commission, compiling a study of reciprocity between the United States and Canada which was later published as one of the tariff commission reports.

Wolf grew disillusioned with this work and decided that he should instead focus his attention on writing. He moved to New York to work on the editorial staff of liberal journal *The Freeman* between March and May 1920 and also did freelance editorial work in New York, California, and Connecticut. He and Page divorced in May 1920, and on March 21, 1921 Wolf remarried, to Genevieve Taggard. Together they had a daughter, Mary Alta Wolf (later renamed Marcia), born on December 13, 1921.

Wolf published a collection of poems, *After Disillusion* (1923) and a novel □*Springboard* (1927). Although both books were well received in literary circles, they did not sell well. His articles, poems, and reviews were published in journals including *The Nation, The Liberator, The Workers Monthly, Poetry,* and xxThe Dial,yy but he struggled financially and relied on his parents for assistance.

In the midst of marital discord with Taggard, Wolf moved to Paris in 1926 to write. He lived in a hotel on the Rue Lacépède and socialized with other Americans then in Paris, including Ernest Hemingway. A long-standing proponent of polyamory, he had affairs with various women, including Katherine Larkin and the painter Andrée Ruellan. His correspondence with those women is in this series.

Upon his return to New York, Wolf's behavior was said to be increasingly erratic. Following an incident in which he threatened to kill his father and a gun was found among his belongings, he was committed to Mattawean State Hospital in 1928 or 1929 on charges of attempted homicide. He was diagnosed as a paranoid schizophrenic and spent the rest of his life institutionalized.

Robert L. Wolf died in 1970.

This series includes correspondence with friends, colleagues, and publishers; drafts of poetry and prose; legal documents; and subject files of Robert L. Wolf. While most of the

materials date from the 1920s, during Wolf's marriage to Genevieve Taggard, there are also some of his writings from high school, as well as two items from his service in World War I and subject files he kept as a Harvard undergraduate. Most of these materials appear to have been kept by Taggard herself, though some items appear to have been provided by Wolf's parents at an unknown date. All of the material in this series was part of the 2010 addition to the papers. They are significant not only because they illustrate Wolf's relationship to Taggard, but also because they document his own life and writing, which have been largely obscured.

Much of the correspondence is from Wolf's time living and writing in Paris, between 1926 and 1928, and includes lengthy and anguished letters to Genevieve Taggard about the disintegration of their marriage, his romantic affairs and struggles writing, and his difficulty in finding emotional balance. The correspondence also includes letters to and from publishers, friends, editors, and other writers - notably Sara Bard Field, Ernest Hemingway, Floyd Dell, Lydia Gibson, and Charles Erskine Scott Wood. Of note is Wolf's correspondence with F.W. Taussig, a prominent economist who served as Wolf's mentor at Harvard and wrote to him about his involvement with the United States Tariff Commission and the American Commission to Negotiate Peace at the conclusion of World War I, as well as Wolf's correspondence with his parents from his college days into adulthood.

Also of note in this series is Wolf's writing, most of which was never published. Included are multiple drafts of poems, short stories, and essays, as well as a screenplay and technical directions for the filming of a piece called *Loony*, originally published in *The Nation* on September 9, 1925, with illustrations by Louis Lozowick. The filming, which was to take place in the Soviet Union, fell through at the last minute. In addition, this series includes subject files Wolf kept as a student, revealing his interest in political affairs, as well as lecture notes on socialism from the year he taught at Harvard (1916-1917).

#### Series III: Kenneth Durant, 1932-1981 (8 boxes)

Kenneth Durant (1889-1972) was born on October 9, 1889 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He attended Harvard College, receiving an A.B. in 1911 and an A.M. in 1914. During World War I he served as assistant director of the news division of George Creel's Committee on Public Information. He also worked in Paris, New York, and Rome with the foreign press and cable division. In 1919, he attended the Versailles peace conference as an aide to Colonel Edward M. House, Woodrow Wilson's envoy. From 1923 to 1944, Durant was the U.S. bureau chief of the Soviet news agency TASS (Telegraph Agency of the Soviet Union), based in New York City. He was first married to literary editor Ernestine Evans, and following their divorce he married Genevieve Taggard in March 1935. Following Taggard's death, he remarried to Helen van Dongen, a film editor, in 1950. Together they worked on a study of the origins and evolution of the Adirondack guide-boat, eventually publishing an authoritative history on the subject. Kenneth Durant died in November 1972 in Jamaica, Vermont.

This series contains correspondence, legal documents, and other materials related to Durant's decades-long attempt to compile a comprehensive bibliography of Genevieve Taggard's work and to ensure that her legacy endured by donating her papers and books to libraries and archives. It includes papers of a more personal nature, such as records of Durant's adoption of Marcia, Taggard's daughter with Robert L. Wolf, and correspondence with many of Taggard's friends and former students in the years after her death.

Of particular note are the bibliographic card files, which Durant compiled over the course of many years. Because no comprehensive bibliography of Taggard's published work exists, these files are useful for scholars hoping to grasp the extent of her work or to locate lesser-known works. All materials in this series relate to Taggard and/or Durant's advocacy for her legacy; none of his papers, personal or professional, concerning other matters are included here.

#### Series IV: Marcia Durant Liles, 1929-2001 (5 boxes)

Marcia Durant Liles (1921-2002) was originally named Mary Alta Wolf when she was born in Chicago on December 13, 1921. Her parents were Genevieve Taggard and Robert L. Wolf. For the first several years of her life, she lived in San Francisco, Carmel, and Berkeley, California with her mother. Her godmother, Sara Bard Field, was also in California at that time. As a child she attended various boarding schools, including a stint at Beacon Hill School in England, run by Bertrand Russell and his wife Dora. Later, when her mother remarried, she was adopted by her stepfather, Kenneth Durant, and her legal name was changed to Marcia Durant. She graduated from Vassar College in June 1943. On October 7, 1949 she married Robert McKesson Liles (1919-1991) in New York. They moved to Los Angeles, where she worked in the film industry, though they later returned to live in New York City. Marcia Durant Liles died on May 22, 2002.

This series includes correspondence, records concerning the literary estate of Genevieve Taggard, memorabilia, poetry, and prose. The correspondence in many instances is related to Liles' involvement in maintaining her mother's legacy and the management of her estate and literary rights, but it also contains her personal correspondence with family, friends and mentors, including writer and editor Sanora Babb, grandmother Alta Taggard, and stepsister Barbara Fiske. Of particular note is Liles' correspondence with her mother and father (Genevieve Taggard and Robert Wolf), including numerous letters from Wolf during his institutionalization at Mattawean State Hospital.

Also of note are materials related to Liles' multiple attempts to publish collections of her mother's poetry posthumously. One such volume, *To the Natural World*, was successfully published in 1980, but others languished and never saw fruition. This series also holds memorabilia - childhood report cards, a travel journal, and a passport - as well as Liles' thesis at Vassar College and notes for a novel about her memories of Mallorca, where she lived with her mother when she was a Guggenheim fellow.

### Series V: Taggard family, 1881-1948 (2 boxes)

Alta Taggard (1868-1951) was born Alta Gail Arnold on February 20, 1868 in Illinois. She married James Nelson Taggard on July 24, 1892, and they had three children together: Genevieve, Ernestine, and James Norman (called Norman). She was a school teacher and a missionary of the Campbellite sect, and for a time ran a boarding house in Berkeley, California. She died in Los Angeles County, California on August 2, 1951.

James Nelson Taggard (1861-1939) was born in Webster County, Missouri on February 2, 1861. He married Alta Gail Arnold on July 24, 1892 in Waitsburg, Washington and worked for many years as a school teacher and administrator. He died in Berkeley, California on August 19, 1939.

James Norman Taggard (1902-1986), commonly known as Norman, was born on March 20, 1902 in Honolulu, Hawaii. He died January 5, 1986 in Beverly Hills, California.

Ernestine Kealoha Taggard (1900-1943) was born on March 14, 1900 in Hawaii. She was called Steeny by her family and friends and attended the Punahou preparatory school. She later attended the University of California at Berkeley, where she received a B.A. in 1922. Following graduation, she worked for the university's Department of Economics for several years before moving to New York to work in the publishing industry. She worked for J. B. Lippincott Company before becoming Literary Editor of *Senior Scholastic*. She died on March 2, 1943, following an unexpected illness and serious operation.

This series contains correspondence and other papers of Genevieve Taggard's parents, Alta and James, as well as those of her siblings, Ernestine and Norman. There are certificates and letters of recommendation concerning both Alta and James' teaching credentials; correspondence between the members of the family; and James Taggard's genealogical research materials and memoirs. These materials provide insight into Genevieve Taggard's family relations and the subjects of some of her writing, as well as an understanding of the family's history in a broader scope.
