Withere were two types of questionnaires sent out. The first type was sent to radio stations, colleges, libraries, all C.C.C. camps, YMCA"s etc. This survey was designed to locate "listening groups". The second survey was sent to the "listening groups", which would establish information about the groups. There were groups called "designated listening groups", because they registered with their radio station as a listening group. The results from this survey were to be used to promote better education by radio. The American Town Hall Meeting of the Air and, also, Levering Tyson, director of The National Advisory Council on Radio in Education took part in this survey.
