Abstract: The Katherine Ruth Heyman Songs is the work of an American woman piano soloist and composer who flourished in the first decades of the twentieth century.

Creator History

Katherine Ruth Heyman was a pianist and composer.

She was born in Sacramento, California, in 1877. Her father was Arnold Heyman, a noted violinist and pupil of Louis Spohr. Her first teacher was her father, and she made her debut when she was six years old. A period of study in Berlin lasted from 1981 to 1894, where she studied piano with Heinrich Barth, and harmony with L. Tortilowius and Hugo Kaun. In Vienna she studied with various students of Leschetizky, and continued her theoretical studies in London with Adolph Mann. Upon her return to the United States, she studied theory with Carrie Alchin of Dayton, Ohio, and Arthur Farwell, among others. She made her professional debut as soloist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra on October 13, 1899. From 1905 through 1915 she made London her home base from which she could tour European cities. She was especially proud of her successes in St. Petersburg as well as other cities in Russia. It was while living in England that her songs first became known to singers. While living there she befriended Ezra Pound, and set some of his verses to music. He dedicated his poem *Scriptor ignotus* to her.

After her return to the United States she continued to concertize. Her programs reflected a strong interest in contemporary music, probably an outgrowth of her compositional desires. She became a champion of Scriabin's piano music, often devoting half or all of her recitals to his work. Her support of contemporary music extended beyond her recitals to lectures. In 1921 she became director of music at the Knox School in Cooperstown, New York and published several of her lectures as *The Relation of ultra-modern to archaic music* (Boston: Small, Maynard, 1921). She continued to give recitals and lectures, and in 1928 she founded the Groupe Estival pour la Musique Modern in Paris. In 1934 she began to appear regularly in New York City where she settled.

Katherine Ruth Heyman died at age 65, on September 28, 1944 of a heart ailment on her way to St. Luke's Hospital in New York City.

Scope and Content Note

The Katherine Ruth Heyman Songs collection represents a significant part of the composer's output. They range from the 1980s while she was still learning her craft, to a decade before her death, with the bulk falling around the time of her concert tours. The varied selection of text probably reflects her tours to various foreign cities, as it represents her level of intellectual sophistication. Included is a song with a text by her friend Ezra Pound.

Arrangement: Songs are arranged alphabetically by title.
