## **Custodial History**

Frederick Schang donated the Frederick C. Schang Papers to the Music Division in June 1979.

### **Biographical Note**

Frederick Christian Schang, Jr. was born December 15, 1893 in New York City. In 1915 he graduated from the Columbia Graduate School of Journalism. One of his early positions was as a reporter for the *New York Tribune*. He then worked for the Metropolitan Music Bureau, which later merged with other agencies in 1930 to form the Columbia Concerts Corporation (name later changed to Columbia Artists Management, Inc., or CAMI). Schang was elected president of CAMI in 1948, and while he officially retired in 1963, he remained active in the company into the 1970s. During his career he managed a range of performing artists, including Enrico Caruso, Grace Moore, and Lily Pons. He was also responsible for the American debuts of two Russian musicians in the 1950s – pianist Emil Gilels, and violinist David Oistrakh. In his spare time, Schang collected visiting cards of musicians and other celebrities, amassing enough to publish four volumes of the images. He retired to Delray Beach, FL, and died there in August 1990.

## **Scope and Content Note**

The Frederick C. Schang Papers consist of one box (0.5 linear feet) with two types of correspondence. The first is letters or similar items collected for their autographs; these cover an extensive number of years – from 1808 to 1976. A letter from Louis Spohr regarding a piano is the oldest item, and includes a typescript translation; a second letter from him is the next oldest item, dated 1817. The other type of correspondence is personal letters that document his professional relationships with clients, as well as other contemporaries. Many of these letters are addressed to Schang, and only occasionally is there a letter from him to the writer. Folders with a significant number of items include Victor Babin, Dorothy Kirsten, Grace Moore, and the Trapp Family Singers. There is no documentation of official CAMI business, or correspondence between Schang and its board members.
