Biographical Note

Wladimir Selinsky (b. Kiev, Russia, Feb. 15, 1910; d. New York City, Sept. 6, 1984) was born into a musical family. He was raised in Berlin and was a child prodigy violinist, performing and conducting at an early age. His family immigrated to the United States in 1925. Almost immediately Selinsky won a scholarship to study at the Institute for Musical Art (Julliard). He originally planned to be a concert violinist, but after his father fell ill Selinksy was forced to find work on Broadway as a concert master and assistant conductor. He also performed in various orchestras conducted by Bruno Walter, Leopold Stokowski, and Pierre Monteux.

In the 1930's, Selinsky began an active career as a composer and conductor for radio shows produced by the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) and the National Broadcasting Company (NBC). He worked with Helen Hayes on two dramatic anthology programs, *Textron Theatre* and *Helen Hayes Theatre*, collaborating with Hayes to create the background music for adaptations of plays by such authors as Sinclair Lewis and Thornton Wilder.

Selinsky also worked on educational programs sponsored by National Association of Educational Broadcasters (N.A.E.B.), including *The Jeffersonian Heritage* (featuring Claude Raines) and *People Under Communism*, and also worked on programs for the Voice of America. Throughout the 1940's, Selinsky also had his own NBC radio program, *Strings In Swingtime*, which featured his own string quartet and orchestra. He recorded a number of violin pieces for Columbia Records, and composed and conducted music for CBS and NBC radio auditions and a radio and television workshop sponsored by the Ford Foundation in 1957. He also wrote stock film music under the pseudonym "Ward Sills" for the company Video Moods, Inc., some of which was used in the famed Ed Wood film *Plan 9 From Outer Space* (1959).

With the rise of television and the subsequent decline of network radio programs in the mid-1950's, Selinsky's career shifted to that medium, where he worked for the remainder of his career. The programs he worked on included dramatic anthologies such as *Du Pont Show of the Week*, *Kraft Television Theatre*, *Lux Video Theatre*, and *U. S. Steel Hour*, and several television movies in the 1970s and 80s, including *Forbidden City*, *The Arthur Peach Story*, *Miles To Go Before I Sleep* and *Family Reunion* (featuring Bette Davis). Selinsky died of heart failure at the age of 74.

Scope and Content Note

The Wladimir Selinsky Papers consist primarily of scripts for the radio and television productions for which Selinsky composed music, and the scores for that music. Radio programs with scripts and scores include the anthologies *CBS Electric Theatre, CBS Helen Hayes Theatre* and *CBS Textron Theatre*, and the educational series *The Jeffersonian Heritage* and *People Under Communism*. Television productions documented by scripts and/or scores include the series *Lux Video Theater* and *Kraft Television Theater*, and the network television films *Forbidden City, Miles To Go Before I Sleep* and *Family Reunion*. The collection also contains stock film music composed by Selinsky, some of which may have appeared in the Ed Wood film *Plan 9 From Outer Space*. There is also a set of arrangements by Selinsky of popular songs presumably used for *Strings In Swingtime* broadcasts, as well as recordings. In addition to scores and scripts, the collection has a small amount of papers, mainly production notes and music timings, and a few financial papers.

Organization

The collection is organized into 2 series and 6 sub-series. They are:

Series I: Scripts And Papers, 1941-1975 and undated Sub-series 1 – Radio, 1941-1957 and undated Sub-series 2 – Television, 1951-1975 and undated
Series II: Scores, 1944-1981 and undated Sub-series 1 – Radio, 1944-1952 and undated Sub-series 2 – Television And Film, 1950-1981 and undated Sub-series 3 – Song Arrangements & Orchestrations, 1953-1954 and undated Sub-series 4 – Oversized Arrangements & Orchestrations, 1945 and undated

Series Descriptions

Series I: Scripts And Papers, 1941-1975 and undated

This series consists mainly of scripts for the radio and television productions that Selinsky wrote music for. Most of the scripts are adaptations by a staff writer of original plays or stories. It also includes notes on timings for music cues, and a small amount of business and financial papers. Script authors are credited when known. All scripts are arranged in broadcast sequence within its program series.

Sub-series 1 – Radio, 1941-1957 and undated Alphabetical

Radio scripts are divided into dramatic and documentary programs. Most of the dramatic scripts are from the series *CBS Electric Theatre* and the two Helen Hayes projects, *CBS Helen Hayes Theatre* and *CBS Textron Theatre*. Several dramatic scripts were not obviously associated with any series and are listed under General. Most of the educational scripts are episodes of *The Jeffersonian Heritage*, but also include the two scripts for *People Under Communism*. Authors of scripts are listed with titles when known. Authors include Stephen Vincent Benet, James M. Barrie and Laurence Houseman. This sub-series consists entirely of scripts.

Sub-series 2 – Television, 1951-1975 and undated Alphabetical

Two television series, *Kraft Television Theater* and *Lux Video Theater*, are represented in this sub-series, and include plays by Stephen Vincent Benet and James M. Barrie. Selinsky's later work on television films is documented here, including *Miles To Go Before I Sleep* (1974) and *Family Reunion* (1981). Some of these files contain music timing notes and correspondence, not scripts.

Series II: Scores, 1944-1981 and undated

This series consists of scores, parts and lead sheets for incidental music Selinsky wrote for radio and television programs as well as arrangements of popular songs (and some songs of his own) he wrote for broadcasts and recordings. Scores from TV or radio series are arranged in broadcast sequence.

Sub-series 1 – Radio, 1944-1952 and undated Alphabetical

Scores for two programs constitute the bulk of this sub-series: *CBS Electric Theatre* and *CBS Textron Theater*. Other programs include *Helen Hayes Theatre*, *The Jeffersonian Heritage* and *People Under Communism*. Scores for these programs generally include only a sketched full score in pencil. In some cases there is only a title page and no score.

Sub-series 2 – Television And Film, 1950-1981 and undated Alphabetical

The bulk of the scores in this sub-series are for television films or stock film cues written for the company Video Moods, Inc., also known as Emil Ascher, Inc. There are also scores for one television series, *Lux Video Theatre*. The television film *Family Reunion* (1981) has the most scores, and includes full scores and parts. *Forbidden City* (1973) and *Miles To Go Before I Sleep* (1975) also have full scores, though no parts. The scores for Video Moods probably contain music that was included in the Ed Wood film *Plan 9 From Outer Space*, for which Wood purchased stock music.

Sub-series 3 – Songs, Arrangements, and Orchestrations, 1953-1954 and undated Alphabetical

This sub-series consists of lead sheets, scores and parts for Selinsky arrangements of popular songs (some songs are composed by Selinsky). The arrangements were used for broadcast on Selinsky's *Strings In Swingtime* program and for recordings, and are usually for string quartet or string orchestra with added woodwinds, piano, percussion and harp, though arrangements for full

orchestra, jazz big band or choirs can be found as well. Many contain a published lead sheet or, in some cases, a published stock arrangement customized by Selinsky with additional parts or edits. Most of the arrangements are undated, though they likely date from the mid-1930s to the 1940s. Some folders contain only lead sheets or sketches for arrangements. See also oversized arrangements in sub-series 4.

Sub-series 4 – Oversized Arrangements Alphabetical

These scores are from the same set of scores as in sub-series 3, and have similar contents.
