Abstract: Martha Pryor Anderson was an African American woman poet and dramatic performer. This collection consists of correspondence, notebooks, programs, printed matter, and scrapbooks documenting Anderson's activities as a poet and diseuse.

Creator History

Born in Richmond, Virigina, in 1890, Martha Pryor Anderson was an African American woman poet and dramatic performer. She founded the Pryor's Dramatic Players in Richmond in the 1930s, but later moved to New York where she started the group anew. She made her debut at Carnegie Hall in the early 1940s. She travelled extensively, appearing in churches, local schools, and colleges. Her repertoire included some of her own poems and dramatic works. She died in Harlem in 1993.

Scope and Content Note

This collection consists of correspondence, notebooks, programs, printed matter, and scrapbooks documenting Martha Pryor Anderson's activities as a poet and diseuse, and her membership in the Abyssinian Baptist Church in New York. There are also writing samples, mainly poems, hymns, and her memoirs. The collection also includes materials documenting her 95th birthday trip to Richmond, where she was honored by the Ebenezer Baptist Church and the Governor's office (in the Abyssianian Baptist Church file).

Subject files

Also included are publications, again most likely from organizations of which Anderson was a member or, in the cases of the books of poetry, from authors with whom she was acquainted.
