Abstract: Kathleen Collins (1941-1988) was a playwright, filmmaker, director, novelist, short story writer, and professor of film history and production. Her papers include personal matter, correspondence, printed matter, and various drafts of her writing.

Creator History

Kathleen Collins (1941-1988) was a playwright, filmmaker, director, novelist, short story writer, and professor of film history and production. She was born on March 18, 1942, in Jersey City, New Jersey. She attended Skidmore College, where she was introduced to activism upon joining the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC); as a member of SNCC, she worked on black southern voter registration. After receiving her bachelor's degree, she earned a master's degree in French literature and cinema at the Middlebury College program at Paris's Sorbonne. From 1967-1974, Collins worked as a film editor for various organizations, including the BBC, Craven Films, and William Greaves Productions, among others. She taught in the Theatre Arts Department of City College in New York City from 1974 until her death in 1988.

Collins was the first African American woman to write, direct, and produce a full-length feature film (*The Cruz Brothers and Miss. Malloy*, 1980, which was based on a Henry Roth novel). Her second feature film, *Losing Ground* (1982), which she directed and coproduced, was based on her original screenplay; it received international acclaim. Also a playwright, her 1982 play, *The Brothers*, was named one of the twelve outstanding plays of the season by the Theatre Communications Group. In 1982 and 1983, she was a finalist for the Susan Blackburn International Prize for Playwriting. Although only a small amount of her work was published before her death in 1988, she wrote six playscripts, over fifteen short stories, and five screenplays. Some of this material was published in two posthumous publications, her short story collection, *Whatever Happened to Interracial Love?* (2016), and *Notes from a Black Woman's Diary: Selected Works of Kathleen Collins* (2019). These publications not only exemplify the breadth of her talent but have introduced her work to a wider audience.

Scope and Content Note

The Kathleen Collins papers consist of personal and biographical material, correspondence, professional matter, and writing. The personal material includes diplomas, a sketch pad, and her parents' yearbooks, among others. The correspondence, which is all personal, contains letters to and from family and friends; additionally, there is some correspondence between her daughter, Nina Collins, and various family members and friends after Collins's death. The professional matter, which is the smallest series, is comprised of professional correspondence with editors and producers, contracts, and printed matter. The last series, writing, is the largest; it contains manuscripts, published and unpublished, of her various writing, including playscripts, short stories, screenplays, and a novel. This series also consists of writing by Collins's daughter, Nina Collins, who edited *Notes from a Black Woman's Diary*.

This series is divided into two subseries; the first subseries, Biographical, is comprised of material from and about Kathleen Collins, such as her high school and college diplomas, newspaper clippings from when she was a teenager, various resumes, divorce papers, and obituaries, among others. The second subseries, Family, mostly contains material from and about her parents, such as yearbooks, correspondence, and genealogical information. It is further divided into subgroups for each of her parents, Frank Conwell, her father; her mother, Mildred (Jones) Conwell, who died when Collins was a baby; and her stepmother, Lauretta (Anderson) Conwell, who raised Collins. There also is an extensive amount of documents about Mildred Conwell's ancestors, compiled by her cousin, Lois Miller Bryan, and her sister, Francine Conwell, around 2007.

Much of this correspondence includes condolence letters and sympathy cards for the death of her mother. Since Nina Collins is the executor of the Kathleen Collins's estate and edited *Notes from a Black Woman's Diary*, she also contacted family and friends for information on her mother, which comprises the rest of the correspondence. There is a small amount of professional and general correspondence for Nina Collins, some of which includes condolences.

The majority of this series, the largest, contains typescript drafts of Collins's various writing, including her playscripts, short stories, and screenplays, among others. Most of the drafts have handwritten edits, but many are photocopies.

Published 1975-1988

During her life, only a few works of Collins's were published, some of them included here. Many of Collins's previously unpublished work was published posthumously in two volumes, *Whatever Happened to Interracial Love?*(2016) and *Notes from a Black Woman's Diary* (2019). This series mostly contains the material from these two publications, in the order in which they are organized in the final publications themselves. Since Nina Collins edited the latter publication, many of the drafts contain her handwritten comments (usually in colored ink).
