Biographical Note

George Reynolds Freedley, author, librarian, lecturer, educator, and theatre critic was born September 5, 1904 in Richmond, Virginia. He was the son of George Jacoby Freedley and Maude A. Reynolds. Freedley graduated from the University of Richmond in 1925. He studied at Yale University, where he was a student of George Pierce Baker from 1926 to 1928, and received his Master of Fine Arts in drama in 1936. After leaving Yale in 1926 Freedley worked in the theatre in various capacities, including three years as an assistant technical director and a stage manager of the New York Theatre Guild. As an actor, Freedley appeared in *The Grey Fox* (1928), *The Camel Through the Needle's* Eye (1929), and Everything's Jake (1930). Freedley began his career at the New York Public Library in the picture collection. When David Belasco's papers were donated to the library with the stipulation that they be made available to the public. Freedley was selected to organize them and the Theatre Collection was born. Beginning in 1931 as "librarian in charge", Freedley was appointed curator of the Theatre Collection in 1938. Except for a brief absence from 1948 to 1950 when he took a position as Chief Play Reader for A & S Lyons, Freedley retained his curatorial post at the library until 1965 when poor health made it necessary for him to change his status to that of a consultant to the Collection.

During his tenure at the library Freedley also pursued his work on behalf of theatre history and theatre librarianship through numerous professional affiliations. He established the Theatre Library Association and served as its president from 1937 to 1963. He also served on the board of the American National Theatre and Academy (ANTA) from 1946 to 1964. Freedley gave his time and expertise to many organizations promoting international cultural exchange including the International Federation for Theatre Research and the Société Universelle du Théâtre. He was a delegate to the UNESCO Theatre Conference in Paris (1948) where the International Theatre Institute was established. Other organizational affiliations included: American Educational

Theatre Association, Equity Library Theatre, National Theatre Conference, New York Drama Critics Circle, Pirandello Society, The Players, and the Shaw Society of America.

Freedley wrote frequently on the theatre, theatre education and theatre librarianship. He was a regular columnist for *Playbill* and the dramatic critic (1938-1947), book editor and drama feature writer (1947-1967) for the *Morning Telegraph* (New York). He was also a reviewer of theatrical books for *Publisher's Weekly*. Freedley's monographs include *The Lunts: a Biography* (1957), *Simon Lissim: a Biography* (1949), *A History of Modern Drama* (with Barrett H. Clark, 1947), and *A History of the Theatre* (with J.A. Reeves, 1941). In 1960 Freedley published a memoir of his cat: *Mr. Cat*, and he also wrote *More Mr. Cat* in 1961. During his lifetime Freedley was honored many times receiving the Kelcey Allen Award in 1956 and the Theta Alpha Phi Educational Award in 1957. He also accepted a Tony on behalf of the Theatre Collection in 1956. George Freedley died on September 7, 1967.

Scope and Content Note

The George Freedley Papers span the years 1861 to 1971 with the bulk of the material ranging from 1935 to 1966. The papers consist of correspondence, writings, clippings, biographical material, research materials, photographs, scrapbooks and miscellaneous items documenting Freedley's career as a librarian, lecturer and writer. The papers also include a collection of greeting cards from theatrical personalities.

George Freedley's involvement with the theatre began during his college days and continued as the focus of his work for the ensuing 40 years. This focus was evident in his endeavors including the Theatre Collection, his writings, reviews, speaking engagements and organizational affiliations, and is documented in this collection. Freedley was known and respected by a wide range of theatre professionals from Broadway to the academic community, both here and in England. The collection includes letters from actors, producers, designers, critics, and writers, including Carl Theodore Dreyer, Hallie Flanagan, Rosamond Gilder, Lillian Gish, Phyllis Hartnoll, Simon Lissim, Flora Robson and John Van Druten. It also contains material relating to Freedley's work in organizations such as ANTA, the International Theatre Institute and the National Theatre Conference to promote theatre scholarship and international cultural exchange. Freedley also worked on projects to identify and describe theatre collections throughout the world and to make that information available to researchers.

The files are almost exclusively incoming letters documenting personal and professional matters, including letters relating to two of Freedley's books.

Chronological

General correspondence includes personal and professional correspondence from Freedley's friends and colleagues. Freedley corresponded with a great number of writers, producers, critics, scholars, actors, and other theatre professionals. The correspondence includes references to drama in America and England, discussion of various theatre awards, social engagements, reference requests, and requests for help in finding work or in critiquing a manuscript. Among writers the collection includes letters from Edward Albee, Robert Anderson, Lewis John Carlino, Marc Connelly, Dina Forbes-Robertson, James Leo Herlihy, Herbert Kubly, Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee, Howard Lindsay and Russel Crouse, Gertrude Norman, Phillip Pruneau, Elmer Rice, Dodie Smith, Gerard Willem Van Loon, and Thornton Wilder. Producers and directors who corresponded with Freedley include F. Ray Comstock, Cheryl Crawford, Hallie Flanagan, Margo Jones, Elia Kazan, John Reich, and

Henry Schnitzler. The collection also includes letters from the actors Mady Christians, Eva Condon, Tamara Daykarhanova, Grace Elliston, Lillian Gish, Sam Jaffe, Eva Le Gallienne, Alfred Lunt, Mary Martin (one letter describes her experiences in South Pacific in London in 1947), Laurence Olivier, Flora Robson, Tonio Selwart, and Blanche Yurka. Scholars, theatre historians, and critics include Julius Bab, John Beaufort, William G.B. Carson, George Eells, John Gassner, Rosamond Gilder, Phyllis Hartnoll, Burns Mantle, Allardyce Nicoll, Kenneth Tynan, and Willela Waldorf. Other correspondents include Marta Abba, Simon Lissim, Erwin and Maria Piscator, and Lee Simonson. Some of the most frequent correspondents in the general correspondence are Phyllis Hartnoll, a writer and editor at Oxford University Press, Rosamond Gilder, Flora Robson, and Gertrude Norman.
