Creator History

African-American sociologist, Alphonso Pinkney (1928-2006), was a nationally known expert on race relations. From 1961 until his retirement, Pinkney taught sociology at Hunter College where he served as chair of the Department of Sociology from 1975-1984. He authored seven books, contributed chapters to seven others, and wrote many articles for academic journals.

Scope and Content Note

The Alphonso Pinkney manuscript and research collection pertains to several books Pinkney authored, primarily about race relations, and consists of handwritten and typed drafts, notes, news clippings, complete issues of pertinent newspapers, and papers written by other researchers. Galley and page proofs, reviews, promotional material, royalty statements, and correspondence comprise the types of documents from his publishers. The books for which there is material are *The American Way of Violence* (1972), "The Beatification of Ronald Reagan" (unpublished), *Black Americans* (1969), *The Committed: White Activists in the Civil Rights Movement* (ca. 1968), *The Myth of Black Progress* (1985), and *Red, Black and Green: Black Nationalism in the United States* (1976). This collection also contains an untitled manuscript, papers presented at conferences, and published articles.

Arrangement: Arranged into 6 series: I. The American Way of Violence; II. "The Beatification of Ronald Reagan"; III. Black Americans; IV. The Committed: White Activists in the Civil Rights Movement; V. The Myth of Black Progress; and VI. Red, Black and Green: Black Nationalism in the United States.
