**Abstract:** This collections contains correspondence, scrapbooks, studio photographs, and various personal items of choreographer Vincenzo Celli. A few items in the collection appear to have been created by Celli's wife, Marion Ivell. Of note are photographs of Celli and his pupil, Katherine Rutgers, taken during the planning and performance of his piece *Religion of the Dance*.

#### **Creator history**

Vincenzo Celli was born Vincenzo Yacullo on May 4, 1900 in Salerno, Italy, immigrating soon thereafter with his parents to Chicago, Illinois. Celli was first exposed to ballet as a teenager and was awed by the movements of dancer Vaslaw Nijinsky, whom he saw perform during the only American tour of the

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Ballets Russes, under the direction of Serge Diaghilev. Several years later Celli moved to New York City, where he performed as an actor both on and off-Broadway with the Washington Square Players. Impressed by Celli's range and ease of movement, choreographer Adolph Bohm approached him to appear in a minor role in his ballet production of *Le Coq d'Or*. A few years later, Celli moved back to Italy, where he studied dance privately for several years under the famed choreographer and dancer Enrico Cecchetti, maestro to dozens of star pupils including Anna Pavlova and, not coincidentally, Nijinsky. Celli would later be referred to as "the son of Cecchetti," as he was the last of his favored private pupils. Celli married opera singer Marion Ivell in 1925. In 1926, he made his debut at the La Scala Opera House, which earned him the prestigious title of danseur/primo ballerino. Celli returned to the United States after performing abroad to begin teaching ballet and continuing the legacy of the Cecchetti style of grace and movement. During his successful private teaching career, Celli served as the ballet master of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo from 1938 to 1940. Among his pupils were Agnes de Mille, Alicia Markova, Anton Dolin, Katherine Rutgers, and contemporary New York City maestro Jerome Robbins. Celli died of a heart attack in Greenwich, Connecticut in 1988.

## Scope and content note

The Vincenzo Celli papers contain address books and journals, correspondence, memorabilia (including scrapbooks), and photographs.

Celli's journals are filled with poems, inspirational quotes from noted authors, and various preparatory performance notes for his 1960s production, *Religion in the Dance*, which also featured Katharine Rutgers. The address books in the collection are from both Celli and his wife, Marion Ivell, and include the names and addresses of friends and associates.

Celli's correspondence consists of letters, postcards, and greeting cards from his extended family and various grateful pupils, as well as correspondence from the Cecchetti Council and other organizations. Correspondence is arranged chronologically when date is known.

Memorabilia includes programs from various Celli and Rutgers performances, as well as an issue of *Dance Index* honoring Enrico Cecchetti, which contains a lengthy biographical essay about Cecchetti written by Celli. Scrapbooks contain newspaper and magazine clippings, personal photographs, greeting cards, and blank postcards. One of the scrapbooks appears to have been created by/for Marion Ivell, as it contains clippings related to Royal British coronations, film stars, and political events.

The bulk of the photographs, although undated, appear to have been taken between the 1920s and 1940s, during the apex of Celli's career. Two of the photo albums hold studio headshots of young pupils, notable stage performers, and celebrities, many of which are warmly inscribed to Celli. A third album contains photographs of Alicia Markova, a student of Celli's, taken by Carl Van Vechten. There are also loose photographs which include professional headshots of Celli and photographs of Katharine Rutgers and other unidentified pupils.
