**Abstract:** Nana Gollner (1919-1980) was one of America's first prima ballerinas. During her career, she danced in ballet companies in Europe, in Frank Tuttle's production, Ballet Carnival, and in a short choreographed film directed by Tatiana Tuttle. The collection contains photographs and negatives of Gollner; Frank Tuttle's correspondence concerning his production; scripts; programs; and clippings.

#### **Creator History**

Nana Gollner (1919-1980) was one of America's first prima ballerinas. In 1935, she danced with David Lichine in the short film *Spring Night*, which was directed by Tatiana Tuttle. She subsequently danced as prima ballerina with Colonel de Basil's Ballet Russe, and toured with Rene Blum's Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

Frank Tuttle (1892-1963) was a Hollywood film director and writer. As a ballet enthusiast, he established the California Ballet, a troupe made up primarily of dancers from motion pictures. Their first performance, and Nana Gollner's American debut as primary dancer, was *Ballet Carnival* produced by Tuttle in 1939.

## **Scope and Content Note**

The production and promotion of *Ballet Carnival* is recorded in studio photographs and negatives of Gollner in various poses, most likely taken as promotional material; Tuttle's correspondence; contracts; a program; and a poster design. Scripts for ballet story ideas by Frank Tuttle, Tatiana Tuttle, Gerald Goode, and others are also present.

Other material relating to Gollner includes stills from the movie *Spring Night* (1935); and candid photographs of Gollner at a social event and dancing with her husband Paul Petroff on a suburban lawn. Programs that include Gollner's performances in Monte Carlo with the Ballet Russes and with The Ballet Theatre are present.
