The National Self Government Committee, Inc. (N.S.G.C.), is an organization composed of educators and others interested in education for effective leadership. #bThe N.S.G.C. was founded i in 1904, under the name Self Government Committee by Richard Welling(1858-1946). The name was eventually changed to The National Self Government, Inc., to reflect to the public, that, the Committee was national not local. Individuals who help organize the Committee were Charles S. Fairchild, Samuel McCune Lindsay, George Haven Putnam and John G. Agar. Other major contributors were Lyman Beecher Stowe and Sophia Pollack. Ms. Pollack joined the Committee c.1929, as Secretary and today, continues to serve in that capacity.

\*bThe N.S.G.C. is organized through a Board of Directors, Junior Directors and the Associate Council. Through this structure, the N.S.G.C. goal is to develop the alert citizen needed in a democracy by practice in schools, colleges and other youth groups. This was accomplished by having the N.S.G.C. speakers attend National Educcation annual meetings; promoting the idea of self government in elementary and secondary schools; encouraging the teaching of civics in schools and colleges; and publishing materials relevant to civics and self government.

#bCurrently, the N.S.G.C. appropriates funds for the support of student projects in the New York City schools. The emphases is for the school/community service programs that actively include a large number of students in the self government process.

The records of the National Self Government Committee, Inc., contains correspondence, minutes, reports, replies to question-naires, writings, financial documents, printed material, scrapbooks and photographs. Presently, the records have a basic arrangement which will be further enhanced with more details after the processing stage.

#bSeries one: General Correspondence, 1901-1948, basically contains incoming correspondence to Welling's from educators, schools concerned with citzenship, students, universities and colleges and educational associations. Subjects covered are responses to literature published by the N.S.G.C.; on going civic activities; progress on self government for young adults; and samples of constitutions of self government in schools. Outgoing correspondence is mainly from Richard Welling, the founder.

Principles were also asked to respond to questionnaires with information on race, ethnic background, sex and age level of students; the effects of self government in schools both positive and negative; and teachers reaction. There are also some assorted replies from other individuals and list of members receiving student government literature.

\*bSeries five: Writings: are Richard Welling's diaries, 1922-47; address book and various other notebooks; mail records (1912); speeches by Welling and others and notes. Series six: Financial Documents are miscellaneous bills and receipts; Series seven: Members lists, printed material, scrapbooks and assorted papers. Series eight: The additions are correspondence c. 1948-1969; Associate Council correspondence; minutes of meetings, 1956-1971; and projects; proposals funded and rejected, 1980-1985; proposals of high school students, 1980-1985 and minutes, 1980-1985; video cassetted: Core Project-Satellite Academy (Chambers Street, NYC).

There are also twenty photographs (mostly duplicates) of boys practicing self government, 1911-1913.
