BIOGRAPHY

The Shorthand Miscellany Collection is an assortment of unrelated manuscripts from various sources representing American and English shorthand systems.

DESCRIPTION

The collection contains manuscripts representing shorthand systems developed between the 17th and 20th centuries.

The manuscripts are written in shorthand with some longhand script on a variety of subjects including shorthand systems. <u>The Bible, New Testament</u>, <u>Book of Common Prayer</u> written by Abraham Nicholas in 1660 is an example of a work written in an English shorthand system which he may have invented. An example of Irish shorthand is also included.

Noted shorthand writers include: Levi H. Clark, Andrew Kippis, James Henry Lewis, Frederick Pitman, Jeremiah Rich, John Shelton, Edmund Willis and John Willis.
