Abstract: Ezra A. Carman was a colonel in the Union Army during the Civil

War, a noted historian on the Battle of Antietam and a civil servant who held several government positions in the late 19th century. Carman served as the chairman of the Antietam Battlefield Board where he extensively researched the battle. The collection contains Carman's correspondence, writings, and his extensive collection of news clippings, maps and other materials concerning the Battle of

Antietam and the Civil War.

Biographical note

Ezra A. Carman (1834-1909) was a colonel in the Union Army during the Civil War who later became a leading historian of the Battle of Antietam. Born in New Brunswick, New Jersey, Carman graduated from the Western Military Institute in 1857. In 1861 he enlisted in the Union Army and was given the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the New Jersey Volunteers, 13th Regiment. After being wounded in Williamsburg, Carman was promoted to colonel. He was promoted to the rank of brigadier general at the close of the war. After his discharge from the Army, Carman went on to hold the positions of Comptroller of Jersey City, New Jersey (1872-1875) and Chief Clerk of the U.S. Department on Agriculture (1877-1885). He served on the Antietam Battlefield Board (1894-1898), where he was responsible for publishing definitive texts and maps on the Battle of Antietam. In 1905 Carman was appointed chairman of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park Commission at the insistence of its previous chairman, Henry V.N. Boynton. He held this position until his death in 1909. Carman's body was interred at Arlington National Cemetery.

Scope and content note

The Ezra A. Carman Papers document the professional and personal life of the Civil War officer, Civil War historian and civil servant. The papers date from 1834 to 1927, with the bulk of the material falling between 1880 and 1900. Included are Carman's personal correspondence; professional correspondence and documents from various government agencies; collected articles, historical documents, news clippings and maps on and from the Civil War.

I. Ezra A. Carman Correspondence and Writings, 1859-1909

Carman's correspondence contains both his incoming personal and professional correspondence. Included here Is his correspondence as the Chairman of the Antietam Battlefield Board and Commissioner of the Chickamauga Chattanooga National Military Park Commission.

Carman's writings file includes incomplete and unsorted manuscripts about the Civil War, addresses he gave, and the notes he kept for these writing projects.

The personal press clippings and documents file contains materials related to his career in the military, including the muster-in form documenting his induction into the New Jersey volunteers.

III. Carman Collection of Civil War Related Materials

A. Individuals

The collections of individuals' papers present in the Carman Papers were most likely collected by Carman for use in his Civil War research.

1. Henry Van Ness Boynton, 1880-1905

Boynton served as Major and Lieutenant Colonel in the 35th Ohio Volunteer Infantry in the Civil War, 1861-65, and commanded the regiment in the Battle of Chickamauga and at the storming of Missionary Ridge. He was brevetted Brigadier General for gallantry at Chickamauga and was awarded the Medal of Honor for Missionary Ridge, on November 25, 1863. Following the war, he was a newspaper correspondent in Washington, D.C. and was subsequently the chairman of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park. In 1898 he served as a Brigadier General of Volunteers in the Spanish-American War. He was the author of "Sherman's Historic Raid," in 1875. Boynton died on June 3, 1905 and was buried in Section 2 of Arlington National Cemetery.

Boynton was Carman's predecessor as the chairman of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Park Commission and a fellow Civil War historian. Carman likely acquired this correspondence through their association at the Commission.

4 8 **2. Don Carlos Buell, 1864**

The letter contained in this file outlines Buell's beliefs as to why he was relieved from his command after the Battle of Perryville. Between 1862 and 1864 he waited while military commissions reviewed his actions as an officer during the war. This letter was written shortly after Buell resigned both his volunteer and regular commissions from the Army.

4 9 **3. Joseph Hooker, 1863-1864**

Materials in this folder include copies of correspondence both to and from Gen. Hooker, including correspondence with President Abraham Lincoln (May 6th, 1863 and May 13th, 1863), and notes from interviews with Gen. Hooker, on Oct. 1st and 10th, 1875, in Garden City, New York.

B. Government and Organizational Records

1. Department of the Interior

After his tenure as Comptroller of Jersey City, Carman accepted the position of Chief Clerk of Department of Agriculture. Collected here is incoming correspondence for the Chairman, Gen. William G. LeDuc and Chief Clerk, Carman. The correspondence reflects routine requests the department would handle.Records from the Veterans Administration were probably acquired by Carman's son, Dr. Louis D. Carman, a V.A. medical examiner in the late 19th century. The documents include correspondence, primarily comprised of pension requests from members of congress on behalf of their constituents, pension certificates approving a request, and pension request cards (index cards) that were filed for reference.

a. Antietam Battlefield Board, 1894-1898

From 1894 to 1898 Carman served as Chairman of the Antietam Battlefield Board. The Board's charge was to chronicle the history of the battle. As seen in the Board members' correspondence, Carman collected many affidavits from people who took part in the battle. Also present in the

collection is a series of first-hand reports that outline the movements of specific divisions and batteries. One result of Carman's work with the Antietam Battlefield Board was the placement of hundreds of markers on the grounds of the Antietam Battlefield National Park which illustrate troop movement during the battle. The 1898 publication of "The Map of the Battlefield of Antietam", which both served as a guide to regiment markers found at the Antietam Battlefield National Park and as a reference for troop movements and battles that took place over the course of the two days of fighting. In 1905 the volume was republished as "The Atlas of the Battlefield of Antietam".

E. Maps

The majority of the maps in the Carman collection are manuscript maps that convey first hand knowledge of troop movement at Civil War battles. One of the projects that Carman oversaw was the assembling of a set of fourteen maps for publication as the "Map of the Battlefield of Antietam" (later renamed "Atlas of the Battle of Antietam). Its likely many of the manuscript maps from Antietam in the series were collected during the process of compiling information for these volumes.
