Abstract: William Bradhurst Osgood Field and his family were prominent

members of New York City and Lenox, Massachusetts society during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Field was an avid book collector, gentleman farmer, and philanthropist who sat on the boards of many organizations, both commercial and charitable, and was a member of over twenty clubs and societies. The collection consists of family, personal, and office correspondence; financial documents; diaries; genealogical records; educational materials; photographs; and ephemera documenting the family's commercial,

philanthropic, and social activities from 1897 to 1934.

Biographical note

William Bradhurst Osgood Field and his family were prominent members of New York City and Lenox, Massachusetts society during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Field was an avid book collector, gentleman farmer, and philanthropist who sat on the boards of many organizations, both commercial and charitable, and was a member of over twenty clubs and societies. He and his family divided the year between the family's three homes: 645 Fifth Avenue in Manhattan, High Lawn in Lenox, and Westfield in Mohegan Lake, N.Y.

His mother, Augusta Currie Bradhurst Field, and his sister, Mary Pearsall Field, were society women who traveled throughout Europe and entertained at their homes in New York City and Mohegan Lake. Mary maintained an extensive correspondence with friends and family. Lila Vanderbilt Sloane Field, his wife, was a great-granddaughter of Cornelius Vanderbilt. Like her husband, Lila was involved in a number of charitable organizations and was an accomplished sportswoman.

William and Lila were the parents of four children. Their older son, William Osgood Field, became a noted glaciologist. Frederick Vanderbilt Field, their younger son, became a member of the Communist movement and the author of a number of books about Asia's economy in the 1930s. Marjorie Lila and Mary Augusta were their two daughters. Marjorie and her husband H. George Wilde took over the High Lawn estate and turned it into one of the region's top dairy farms.

William's paternal uncle, Osgood Field, was a prominent member of London and Rome society in the second half of the 19th century. He conducted the family's business in London and undertook extensive research into the history of the Field family. He published his results as *The Fields of Sowerby near Halifax, England, and of Flushing, New York* in 1895.

Scope and content note

The William B. Osgood Field Papers consist of family, personal, and office correspondence; financial documents; diaries; genealogical records; school and college memorabilia; photographs; and ephemera which record his and his family's commercial, philanthropic, and social activities, chiefly between 1897 and 1934. While the bulk of the collection consists of William B. Osgood Field's papers, other family members are well represented, especially his wife, mother, sister, uncle Osgood, and daughter Marjorie.

The collection is arranged so that William B. Osgood Field's papers come first, followed by the papers of other family members, in alphabetical order.

Some materials are in German, French, and Italian.

Series I. William B. Osgood Field, 1753-1949, n.d. 123 boxes

William B. Osgood Field was born in 1870 in Geneva, Switzerland to Augusta Currie Bradhurst Field and William Hazard Field. He was educated in Dresden, Germany and at the Berkeley School in New York City. He attended the Stevens Institute of Technology and graduated in 1894 with a degree in mechanical engineering. In 1902 he married Lila Vanderbilt Sloane and between 1904 and 1911 they had four children: William Osgood, Frederick Vanderbilt, Marjorie Lila, and Mary Augusta. Lila's parents, William Douglas Sloane and Emily Vanderbilt Sloane, gave the couple two houses as wedding presents; a town house at Fifth Avenue and 51st St. and land in Lenox, Massachusetts. The architecture firm of Delano & Aldrich designed their house, High Lawn, for the Lenox land. It was completed in 1909. The family divided its time between these two homes, spending January through June in Manhattan and July through December at High Lawn. The Fields also spent some time at Westfield, Field's farm in Mohegan Lake, N.Y.

After his graduation, Field worked as a member of the engineer corps of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. Between 1898 and 1902 he worked with Stevens Institute classmates Morris W. Kellogg and Otis A. Mygatt to establish their respective companies, the M.W. Kellogg Company and the Holophane Glass Company. He served as Kellogg's vice-president between 1903-1909 and remained financially interested in both companies throughout his life. From 1903-1905, he attended Columbia University, taking courses in biology and zoology.

In 1900, his uncle, Osgood Field, died and left the majority of his estate to his wife, Katharine Roxana Parker Field, who died the following year. The estate then passed to Field. He retired from business, returning to full-time work only during World War I.

During the war he served as Quartermaster of the Columbia War Hospital (U.S. Army General Hospital No.1) in the United States Army Officers' Reserve Corps and for the United States Army Base Hospital No. 2, the Presbyterian Hospital's unit in France. In January of 1918, Field was assigned as a lieutenant to the Signal Officers' Reserve Corps to attend the School of Aerial Photography at Cornell University. In October he was promoted to captain and moved to Washington, D.C. to become assistant to the Chief of the Military Intelligence Division (MID). He was promoted to the rank of major in June of 1919, one month before he was discharged. Field became a member of the MID's Reserve Corps in 1921 and remained active in the Reserve until 1929.

Field's charitable and philanthropic interests included the Big Brother Movement, the House of Refuge on Randall's Island in New York City, and the Sloane Hospital for Women. He donated time and money to a number of organizations, but was most involved with the House of Refuge. He was appointed to the Board of Managers for the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents in the City of New York (commonly known as the House of Refuge) in 1907 and served on a number of committees and as an inspector until his resignation in 1924. As a member of the parole board, he took a personal interest in at least two of the inmates with whom he maintained a correspondence that lasted for a number of years.

Field was a serious bibliophile. Although he amassed distinguished collections of prints, stamps, coins, crucifixes, and other items, books were his passion. In 1904 he began a forty-year membership in the Grolier Club, serving as president from 1925-1928. He organized exhibits, made gifts and loans of books to the Club, and arranged for the private printings of books for its members. Field also published two catalogs of material from major areas of his own collections: *Edward Lear On My Shelves* and *John Leech on My Shelves*. In addition to his collections of Leech and Lear, Field created one of the largest collections of Rudyard Kipling first editions. In 1942, he bequeathed parts of his collection to the Harvard College Library, including his books and Lear drawings.

Field and his family traveled extensively. He toured Europe as a child and young man, with his family and on his own. In 1897-1898 he traveled to India with George Washington Vanderbilt and kept a diary in the form of letters that he sent regularly to his mother and sister. Early in his marriage, he and Lila spent winters in Florida fishing for tarpon and Lila recorded their catches in her diaries. The couple were members of the Little Cascapedia Fish and Game Club, a group of ten members that leased the Little Cascapedia River and 100 square miles of land around it from the provincial government of Quebec with exclusive fishing and hunting rights to the area. Throughout his thirty year membership, Field served as secretary, vice-president, and president of the Club. The family would fish there during the summers for trout and salmon and hunt for moose and other game in the fall. Field also traveled frequently to Germany. He visited the spa town Marienbad throughout the 1920s and 1930s and also visited Berlin, Hamburg, and Munich.

When Lila died in 1934, Field retreated to Westfield and away from the busy life he had led with his family. He married a young German woman, Erika Segnitz, in 1936. Their marriage was a surprise to his family and to society at large, both of which disapproved of the match. The disapproval led him to withdraw further, and he and Erika divorced in 1940. He was married again in 1944 to Mary Hemenway, his nurse and companion. They lived together at Westfield until his death in 1949.

IA2. Personal Correspondence, 1884-1946, n.d. 7.5 boxes

Correspondence between William B. Osgood Field and friends. Informal correspondence regarding family updates, vacations, plans and invitations, and similar topics. This series shows Field's attitude and opinions to be typical of his social status and of the time, and include approbatory comments on Hitler's revitalization of Germany in the early 1930s.

Notable correspondents include George Washington Vanderbilt (1898-1906, undated), artist Charles Frederick William Mielatz (1901, 1904-1906, 1909), Edith Wharton (1903), theater owner and producer Lee Shubert (1909), Alfred Stieglitz (1910), art critic Royal Cortissoz (1923, 1927, 1930-1934), scientist Hans Zinsser (1928, undated), opera singers Emma Eames (1934) and Geraldine Farrar (1940-1946, undated), Abby Aldrich (1941) and John D. (1942) Rockefeller, Jr. and architect William Adams Delano (undated).

Social clubs include the Century Association, the Little Cascapedia Fish and Game Club, and the Stockbridge Golf Club. Charities and philanthropic interests include the Big Brothers of America, the House of Refuge, and the New York Zoological Society.

His correspondents include Margaret Sanger (Birth Control Clinical Research Bureau and under "S"), gem collector and mineralogist George Frederick Kunz (St. Mary's Episcopal Church), Charles Frederick William Mielatz, and Anson Phelps Stokes.

IB. Collecting Interests, 1839-1949, n.d.

William B. Osgood Field was a passionate collector. He amassed large collections of rare books, coins, caricatures, stamps, crucifixes, and other objects. Although he belonged to a number of organizations dedicated to these interests, he was especially active in the Grolier Club. A member for forty years, 1904-1944, he served as the Club's president between 1924 and 1928. He served on committees, organized and loaned books for exhibits, donated books to the Club's library, gave lectures in his areas of expertise, and published small books for the members.

While the subjects encompassed by Field's collecting were broad, he focused on a few artists and authors. He amassed an excellent collection of Rudyard Kipling first editions and organized a Kipling exhibit at the Grolier Club in 1929. Other highlights of his collections included books, manuscripts and prints by the cartoonists Edward Lear and John Leech. He published catalogs of his Lear and Leech collections in the 1930s and mounted public exhibitions of both at the E.P. Dutton book store in Manhattan.

Field was a patron of the Lenox Library Association in Lenox, Mass. He donated books as well as his time, serving as Secretary of the Board of Managers in 1917-1918 and again from 1923-1928.

This subseries includes correspondence with book and coin dealers, collecting clubs, research assistants, and publishers; invoices; inventories of his collections; typescripts and notes for his books; original Edward Lear and John Leech material; and dealer pamphlets and catalogues.

After graduating from Harvard in 1927, he attended the London School of Economics for a year, where he became interested in socialism. Upon his return to New York in 1928, he met Edward C. Carter and began to work at the Institute for Pacific Relations (IPR) as an assistant secretary. In 1929 he married Elizabeth Brown and together they traveled to Russia, China, Japan, and the Philippines to gather research for IPR. They returned to the United States in 1930 to publish their findings and Field began to work full-time at the IPR as Carter's assistant. He would remain there until 1940.

In 1936 Elizabeth divorced Field and retained custody of their daughter, Lila. He was married again in 1937 to Edith Chamberlain Hunter. They had a daughter, Gail, in 1938. In 1983 he wrote a memoir, From Right to Left: An Autobiography.

Lila Vanderbilt Sloane Field (1878-1934) was the daughter of William Douglas Sloane and Emily Vanderbilt Sloane. She met William B. Osgood Field in 1900 through her uncle, George Washington Vanderbilt. They were married in 1902 and had four children, William Osgood, Frederick Vanderbilt, Marjorie Lila, Mary Augusta.

Unlike her Vanderbilt relatives, Lila disliked large parties and other trappings of Gilded Age society, preferring quiet times with family and a few friends. Despite this, she maintained close relationships with two opera stars of the time, Geraldine Farrar and Emma Eames. She traveled to Europe with her family occasionally, but suffered from seasickness, so did not travel as often as her husband. She enjoyed and excelled at hunting and fishing, traveling to Florida and Canada with her family to pursue these sports (her diaries provide detailed accounts of what she caught on these trips). She was also an accomplished golfer.

Mary Pearsall Field (1865-1946) was the daughter of William Hazard Field and Augusta Currie Bradhurst Field. She was called "Mamie" and "May" by friends and family. Her nieces and nephews called her "Marraine."

As a young woman, Mary studied singing in America and Europe and was said to have a beautiful soprano voice. She wanted to pursue a career as a singer, but her mother would not allow it. After her father's death in 1888, Mary was her mother's constant companion, with a the exception of a few vacations taken separately. Mary was very popular and had a great number of friends and admirers, including one who proposed marriage. She accepted his proposal, but her mother refused her permission to marry. Despite this, Mary maintained a lifelong friendship with her suitor, Gurdon Maynard. She also cultivated the acquaintance of many artists and musicians.

Mary filled her days with visiting and entertaining friends and family in America and Europe. She was an avid reader, attended lectures and classes, visited museums, and made copious notes on the many things she learned throughout her life. She was also a compulsive clipper of newspaper articles and often included them in letters to family.

After Augusta's death in 1919, Mary's life proceeded in much the same way. She continued to travel and spent a great deal of time at Westfield, the family's farm in Mohegan Lake, N.Y., entertaining friends and family. Later in life, she moved to an apartment in the Plaza Hotel, where she was attended by a nurse.

William Osgood Field, known as "Osgood" within the family, was born in 1904, the eldest of William B. Osgood Field and Lila Vanderbilt Sloane Field's children. He was educated at the Hotchkiss School in Lakeville, Connecticut and Harvard University. Field began working for University Film Production at Harvard in 1928, traveling to Africa for his first project. While on this trip he met his first wife, Alice Withrow. Field traveled with the Open Road organization to the Soviet Union and produced a documentary on the people of the Caucasus. Alice became interested in the Soviet Union as well, and traveled there with her husband in 1931 to study the status of women. This trip provided the material for her first book, *Protection of Women and Children in Soviet Russia*.

Field had developed a serious interest in glaciers on trips to Alaska during his college years. He returned to glacier research in the 1930s and became a pioneer and leader in the field. In 1940 he joined the staff of the American Geographical Society remained there until his retirement in 1969. With a Camera in my Hands is the title of his oral biography.

The bulk of his papers can be found in the William O. Field Papers, Alaska and Polar Regions Collections, University of Alaska, Fairbanks and in the William O. Field fonds, Archives and Library, Whyte Museum of the Canadian Rockies, Banff, Alberta, Canada.

In 1932 she married H. George Wilde, an Army officer and West Point graduate. In 1935 they took over her family's estate, High Lawn, in Lenox, Mass. and turned it into a prize-winning dairy farm.
