**Abstract:** Joe Johnson (1940-2019) was a poet and writer who was a member of the Umbra Poets Workshop, a group of young Black writers who met on New York City's Lower East Side from 1962 to 1965 to conduct readings and discuss writing and politics. The Joe Johnson papers consist largely of writings—mostly poetry and fiction, with some drama and nonfiction—by Johnson, as well as notebooks, personal and professional files, and printed material.

## **Creator History**

Joe Johnson was born January 18, 1940, in Harlem. As a young man, he became involved in the Umbra Poets Workshop, a group of young Black writers who met on New York City's Lower East Side from 1962 to 1965 to conduct readings and discuss writing and politics. Johnson's writing appeared in various periodicals, including *Umbra*, *Black Creation*, and *Yardbird Reader*, as well as anthologies including *Poets of Today* (1964) and *The Poetry of Black America* (1973). His published books of poetry include *At the West End* (with Bliem Kern, 1976), *Hot* (1977) and *Tight* (1978).

In 1973, Johnson formed a publishing company with two other former Umbra members, Ishmael Reed and Steve Cannon. The group, Reed, Cannon & Johnson Communications, published works by authors of color, including *Francisco* by Alison Mills, *Black Picture Show* by Bill Gunn, and *Medicine Man* by Calvin Hernton, for which Johnson wrote the introduction.

Johnson attended Hunter College in the early 1960s, then Columbia University, earning a bachelor's degree in art history and English in 1970 and a master's in linguistics from Columbia Teachers College in 1973. He worked at the Harlem Education Project (1962-1963) and City College (1971-1972), before joining the faculty of Ramapo College in New Jersey, where he taught literature from 1971 until his retirement in 2017. He lived in New York until his retirement, after which he moved to Virginia.

Johnson died on February 17, 2019.

## **Scope and Content Note**

The Joe Johnson papers consist largely of writings—mostly poetry and fiction, with some drama and nonfiction—by Johnson. There is also a significant number of notebooks containing a mix of writing drafts, journals, and personal notes. Personal and professional files include material relating to Johnson's publishing business, Reed, Johnson, & Cannon Communications, his teaching career at Ramapo College, and a small amount of personal material and correspondence. Finally, there is printed material, including flyers, press clippings, periodicals, and poetry books (many inscribed to or annotated by Johnson).

## Writings 1983-2017

The writings consist mostly of typescript drafts, many annotated with Johnson's notes and edits. Many are spiral bound (in some cases the bindings have been removed).

The writings are arranged by genre: poetry, fiction, drama, and nonfiction. Within these groupings, they are arranged alphabetically by title, if present, or first line (all titles in quotes are Johnson's own). Some untitled fiction is grouped together when they appear to be versions of the same story or featuring the same character(s).
