Creator History

Gertrude Hadley Jeannette was an actor, playwright, director, and producer. Additionally, she is believed to be the first woman to get a taxi license and drive a cab in New York City.

Born Gertrude Hadley on November 28, 1914, in Urbana, Arkansas, Jeannette met her future husband, Joe Jeannette II, former prizefighter and president of the Harlem Dusters motorcycle club, on prom night. In 1933, they eloped and moved to New York, where she began working as a taxi driver. She also enrolled in shorthand classes at the Abyssinian Baptist Church, where she met Frederick O'Neal, one of the founders of the American Negro Theater. Upon his recommendation, she enrolled in a speech class, held at the Theater, to correct a childhood stammer. Acting was part of the speech therapy curriculum. Since Jeannette had to learn the map of New York City in order to drive a taxi, she realized that she only had to read a script once or twice to know her lines. The American Negro Theater required its students to audition and Jeannette soon became known for her stage presence. She acted alongside such notable figures as Ossie Davis, Ruby Dee, and Sidney Poitier. She was cast in her first Broadway production, *Lost in the Stars*, in 1948. She would subsequently act in other Broadway productions, including *The Long Dream* (1960), *The Amen Corner* (1965), and *Vieux Carré* (1977), among others. She also found roles in film, including *Cotton Comes to Harlem* (1970) and *Shaft* (1971).

In response to what she saw as a lack of authentic black characters in the theater, Jeannette began writing plays in 1950; she wrote five plays altogether including *The Way Forward* (1948-1950); *A Bolt from the Blue* (1950); *Light in the Cellar* (1960), a sequel to *This Way Forward*; *Who's Mama's Baby, Who's Daddy's Child* (1985); and *Gladys' Dilemma* (1990). Also around 1950, during the time of the Second Red Scare, the American Negro Theater closed and Jeannette was barred from working because of her association with Paul Robeson, a singer, actor, and political activist (Jeannette's husband was a bodyguard of sorts for Robeson). Instead of heading to Hollywood like many of her acting peers, she took over a space at the Elks Building, calling it the Elks Community Theater. In 1979, she founded another theater company that would be known as the HADLEY (Harlem Artist's Development League Especially for You) Players. In addition to directing many of the Players productions and overseeing its operations, she transformed her two plays, *This Way Forward* and *Light in the Cellar*, into a novel, *The Secret in the Cellar*, which was published in 2006.

Jeannette received numerous awards and accolades during her lifetime including the Paul Robeson Award from Actors' Equity. She continued to act into her 80s and retired from directing at 98. She died at age 103 in April 2018.

Scope and Content Note

The Gertrude Hadley Jeannette papers consist of material regarding her personal life and her various

careers as an actor, writer, director, and the founder of the HADLEY Players. The personal material is small and mainly consists of a few personal documents, correspondence, and awards. The professional material includes correspondence, playscripts, film scripts, and printed matter (such as reviews, clippings, and interviews) in relation to her performances, writing, teaching, and management of the HADLEY Players. The Writing series, which is the largest, contains various drafts, typescripts, and notes, mainly of her playscripts and novel. The last series, Subject files, includes mostly printed matter about friends and colleagues; topics such as black theater; and publications, many of which are playscripts and film scripts.

This series consists of Jeannette's personal documents, the majority of which are awards. Biographical, the first subseries, contains such material as a copy of her birth certificate, property deeds, correspondence, family obituaries, and daily planners. The second subseries, Awards, includes various awards bestowed on Jeannette for her acting career, such as the Paul Robeson Award, and as the founder of the HADLEY Players, such as the Black Art History Makers Award; these files mostly contain the awards themselves, many of which have been removed from frames.

Professional ca. 1950-2016

This series relates to Jeannette's multiple professional careers. The performing and writing subseries contains resumes; correspondence; various playscripts and film scripts; and printed matter, which includes interviews with Jeannette and reviews of her performances and writing. The scripts are further arranged into two subgroups, one of which consists of the film scripts and playscripts in which she acted or for which she auditioned, and the other of which contains playscripts she directed or showed an interest in directing. The second subseries, the smallest, is comprised of material from her time as an instructor at the Arts and Culture Pre-Vocational Program of Central Harlem. The third subseries consists of material related to Jeannette's role as the founder and CEO of the Hadley Players. This material includes correspondence, meeting minutes, financial information, grant applications, reviews of plays produced, and printed matter related to productions, such as playbills and flyers.

Arranged into three subseries chronologically: (1) Performing and writing; (2) Teaching; and (3) HADLEY Players.

Includes typescript with handwritten notes of the play, which was produced under a different name, *Happy Ending*; Jeannette played the role of Isabel at the Loretto-Hilton Theater in St. Louis, Missouri, from 1980-1981.

Includes material from the Arts and Culture Pre-Vocational Program of Central Harlem, Inc., where Jeannette was an acting instructor from 1974-1975. This material consists of an instruction manual on the interpretation of literary materials, geared towards students taking the high school equivalency exam; a notebook with class rosters, lecture notes, and correspondence; and an instructor's roster form. In addition, the notebook includes a few handwritten pages of her plays, *Light in the Cellar, This Way Forward*, and *Open House*, the latter of which was possibly written specifically for her acting students.

HADLEY Players 1979-2016

The HADLEY Players was established in 1979 by Jeannette; it operated as a non-profit and membership organization. In 1981, it became affiliated with the Community Service Council of Greater Harlem, Inc. Four major productions were presented each season, and in 1987, the group began a school for acting, speech, and dance. Many of the plays produced were written and directed by Jeannette.

Additionally, there are a few flyers for workshops and classes. Of note is a flyer for "An Evening with the Earl Jones' (Father and Son: Robert and James)", from 1982.

Writing 1948-2006

This series, the largest, consists of various drafts and iterations of Jeannette's writing, which includes playscripts, a screenplay, a novel, and two memorials. The majority of the drafts are typescripts with handwritten notes, and a few are photocopies. The subseries are arranged according to when they were first written, not when they were published or produced.

Arranged into four subseries, chronologically according to first drafts: (1) Playscripts; (2) Screenplays; (3) Novel; and (4) Memorials.

Playscripts 1948-1990

It is unclear if any of Jeannette's plays were published, although they all appear to have been produced.

Although *This Way Forward* is normally listed as Jeannette's first play, *A Bolt from the Blue* is arranged first since its first included draft is dated slightly earlier that that of *This Way Forward*.

A Bolt from the Blue 1948

A play about a middle-class black family whose happiness is threatened by someone from the past. It was produced by Jeannette's first theater group, the Elks Community Theatre in Harlem, in 1952, and later by the HADLEY Players.

This Way Forward 1948-1950

A play set in a small southwestern farm town in the mid-1920s in which a black woman from the city, despite resistance, improves conditions for the blacks in the town. Produced by various theaters, including the American Negro Theater in 1949, and the HADLEY Players in 1984.

	It appears that Jeannette began writing the novel that would eventually become <i>The Secret in the Cellar</i> before writing the screenplay; the first draft typescript of the screenplay is indicated as "from the manuscript of <i>This Way Forward to Light in the Cellar</i> ", which was the initial title of the novel. It is listed here first, however, because the date of the first draft is earlier than that of the novel. Jeannette combined her two plays, <i>This Way Forward</i> and <i>Light in the Cellar</i> , in this screenplay and the novel.

Novel 1976-2006

Jeannette's novel, which had various titles before being published as *The Secret in the Cellar*, was based on her two plays, *This Way Forward* and *Light in the Cellar*. From a 1976 letter included with the first draft, she indicates that she had been writing it for a year, but based on the screenplay drafts, it seems as if she began writing it even earlier. Although there are draft contracts with the publisher, Books That Matter, it was eventually published in 2006, by HADLEY Players Productions, with a foreword by Ruby Dee (although her name is misspelled).

There are a few published works, mostly related to theater, acting, and actors. In addition, there is some printed matter on topical subjects, also mostly related to the theater.
